

Adams County

Adams County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY2013

Adams and Brown Counties Economic Opportunities, Inc. received a \$750,000 loan for Oakdale Estates, a multi-family bond and housing credit rental project that involved acquiring and rehabilitating two apartment communities with a total of 94 one-, two-, three- and four-bedroom units and one non-revenue generating staff unit located in the village of West Union, Adams County. Ten units will be affordable to and occupied by households at or below 35 percent of the area median gross income; 33 units will be at 50 percent of the area median gross income; and the remaining 51 units will be at 60 percent of the area median gross income. Project-based Section 8 rental subsidy will remain on all units. Ohio Housing Finance Agency will monitor nine assisted units. The scope of work includes adding a security camera system, and updating all units with new kitchens, baths, floor coverings, appliances, and mechanicals.

SFY2012

Adams and Brown Counties Economic Opportunities, Inc. received a \$63,400 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 45 households consisting of 135 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 15 households consisting of 23 people. Key partners in providing services were the Adams County Shelter for the Homeless and Brown County Metropolitan Housing. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Adams and Brown counties.

Adams and Brown Counties Economic Opportunities, Inc. received a \$60,000 grant to provide educational and business credit opportunities to aspiring entrepreneurs in Adams and Brown counties. This was accomplished through a business education curriculum and one-on-one technical assistance. Individuals that successfully completed the curriculum were eligible to apply for financing through the ABC Micro Loan program.

Adams County Shelter for the Homeless, Inc. received a \$147,800 grant to operate a four-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families and individuals in Adams County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 120 households consisting of 195 people.

SFY2011

Adams and Brown Counties Economic Opportunities, Inc. received a \$60,000 grant to administer its Microenterprise program. Training and technical assistance was provided to 40 low- and moderate-income applicants and two loans were made available for business start-ups.

Allen County

Allen County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY2013

Coleman Professional Services, Inc. received a \$1,250,000 loan for Union Square, a housing credit multi-family permanent supportive housing rental development that involves the new construction of a four-story, 48-unit apartment building located in Lima, Allen County. Ten units will be affordable to households at or below 35 percent of area median gross income; 19 units will be affordable to households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income; and 19 units will be affordable to households at or below 60 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency will monitor 11 assisted units. Project amenities include on-site management, an intercom and security system, additional storage closets for residents and a comprehensive supportive services package including counseling, case management and psychiatric services.

Family Promise of Lima-Allen County received a \$66,500 grant to operate an 11-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families with children in Allen County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 32 households consisting of 120 people.

Lima/Allen Council On Community Affairs received a \$187,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance, including financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services, to homeless families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income in Allen, Auglaize and Mercer counties. The program will serve 30 households consisting of 90 people. The key partner in providing assistance is Sources Community Network Services. Lima/Allen Council on Community Affairs will also provide homelessness prevention assistance, including financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services, to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Allen, Auglaize and Mercer counties. The program will serve 41 households consisting of 123 people. The key partner in providing assistance is Sources Community Network Services.

PSA 3 Agency on Aging, Inc. received a \$40,400 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Allen, Auglaize, Hancock, Hardin, Mercer, Putnam and Van Wert counties. The program will serve 25 households consisting of 40 people.

Vance Street Housing, Inc. received a \$790,000 loan for the Vance Street Apartments, a multi-family bond, housing credit rental project with gap financing located in Bluffton, Allen County. The project involves rehabilitating a three-story elevator building with 40 housing units for residents age 62 and older. Two units will be affordable to and occupied by households at or below 30 percent of area median gross income; 12 units will be affordable to and occupied by households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income; and 26 units will be affordable to and occupied by households at or below 60 percent of area median gross income. Nine assisted units will be monitored by the Ohio Housing Finance Agency. The project involves replacing windows, heating ventilation and air conditioning, appliances, flooring, and kitchen and bathroom updates in all of the units. All common areas will be updated as well.

SFY2012

Lima/Allen Council on Community Affairs received a \$135,600 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 21 households consisting of 64 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization

services to 21 households consisting of 64 people. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Allen County.

SFY2011

Family Promise of Lima-Allen County received a \$66,500 grant to operate a 10-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families. Supportive services provided include case management, meals, transportation, referrals to community service providers and permanent housing placement. The program served 30 households consisting of 120 people.

Lima/Allen Council On Community Affairs received a \$100,000 grant to provide down payment assistance and pre- and post-sale counseling to households at or below 65 percent of area median income in Allen County. Maximum assistance may not exceed \$3,000 per unit. Downpayment assistance is limited to 3 percent of the purchase price plus out-of-pocket expenses. The counseling program served 130 households consisting of 520 people and the Down Payment Assistance Program served 20 households consisting of 80 people.

PSA 3 Agency on Aging, Inc. received a \$130,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs for homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Allen, Auglaize, Hardin, Hancock, Mercer, Putnam and Van Wert counties. The program served 60 households consisting of 80 people.

Ashland County

Ashland County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY2013

Appleseed Community Mental Health Center, Inc. received a \$44,400 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 15 households consisting of 45 people. In addition, the agency will provide rapid re-housing services through financial assistance, and housing relocation and stabilization services to 15 households consisting of 45 people. All people served will be below 30 percent of area median income in Ashland County.

Kno-Ho-Co-Ashland Community Action Commission received a \$175,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Ashland, Coshocton, Holmes and Knox counties. The program will serve 24 households consisting of 100 people.

Kno-Ho-Co-Ashland Community Action Commission received a \$241,900 grant to operate emergency shelters serving homeless families with children in Ashland, Coshocton and Knox counties. Combined, the shelters contain 26 beds. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 70 households consisting of 210 people.

Ohio District 5 Area Agency on Aging, Inc. received an \$800,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners between ages 18 and 59 with disabilities and homeowners age 60 and older. Households served by the program will be at or below 50 percent of area median income in Ashland, Crawford, Huron, Knox, Marion, Morrow, Richland, Seneca and Wyandot counties. The program will serve 240 households consisting of 360 people.

SFY2012

Appleseed Community Mental Health Center, Inc. received a \$136,718 grant to rehabilitate Appleseed Community Mental Health Housing. The facility consists of a main house containing four apartments and an above-garage apartment, for a total of five units for people with severe and persistent mental illness. Rehabilitation includes siding, gutter and roof replacement, exterior door replacement, replacing stairs and landings with treated material in stairwells and installing insulation in exterior walls and ceilings. Major systems were updated and included replacing furnaces and adding air conditioning, hot water tanks and water softeners.

Kno-Ho-Co-Ashland Community Action Commission received a \$69,100 grant to provide rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 15 households consisting of 50 people. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Coshocton and Holmes counties.

SFY2011

Ohio District 5 Area Agency on Aging, Inc. received an \$800,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Ashland, Crawford, Huron, Knox, Marion, Morrow, Richland, Seneca and Wyandot counties. The program served 240 households consisting of 360 people.

Ashtabula County

Ashtabula County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Catholic Charities Housing Opportunities received a \$98,000 grant to provide down payment assistance and pre- and post-sale homebuyer counseling to households at or below 65 percent of area median income in Ashtabula, Columbiana, Mahoning, Portage, Stark and Trumbull counties. Maximum assistance may not exceed \$3,000 per unit. Down payment assistance is limited to 3 percent of the purchase price plus out-of-pocket purchase expenses. The Down Payment Assistance Program will serve 30 households consisting of 70 people. The counseling program will serve 120 households consisting of 280 people.

Coleman Professional Services, Inc. received a \$545,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance, including financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services, to homeless people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income in Ashtabula, Geauga, Lake, Portage and Trumbull counties. The program will serve 71 households consisting of 139 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Catholic Charities of Ashtabula County; Family and Community Services, Inc.; Humility of Mary Housing, Inc.; Ecumenical Shelter Network of Lake County; and Fair Housing Resource Center, Inc. In addition, Coleman Professional Services will provide homelessness prevention assistance, including financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services, to people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Ashtabula, Geauga, Lake, Portage and Trumbull counties. The program will serve 157 households consisting of 372 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Catholic Charities of Ashtabula County; Family and Community Services, Inc.; Humility of Mary Housing, Inc.; Ecumenical Shelter Network of Lake County; and Fair Housing Resource Center, Inc.

SFY 2012

Ashtabula County Commissioners received a \$125,000 grant to rehabilitate five owner-occupied homes, repair an additional 13 owner-occupied homes, and provide homeownership assistance to three households. Ashtabula County used a portion of their Community Housing Improvement Program (CHIP) funds to target Geneva on the Lake.

Ashtabula County Community Housing Development Organization, Inc. received a \$120,000 grant to provide an average of seven scattered-site supportive housing units for homeless people and families who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Ashtabula and Geauga counties. Supportive services include individualized service planning, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The maximum length of stay is 12 months. The program served 28 households consisting of 66 people.

Ashtabula County Community Housing Development Organization, Inc. received a \$160,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Ashtabula and Geauga counties. The program served 22 households consisting of 35 people.

Ashtabula Homeless Shelter, Inc. received a \$92,800 grant to operate a 10-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single males, single females and families with children. Supportive services provided include case management, goal planning, referrals to community service providers and permanent housing placement. The program served 240 households consisting of 260 people.

Catholic Charities of Ashtabula County received a \$93,300 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization

services to 27 households consisting of 60 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to nine households consisting of 15 people. The key partners in providing services will be WomenSafe, Inc. All individuals served will be below 30 percent of area median income in Ashtabula and Geauga counties.

City of Conneaut received a \$125,000 grant to provide home repair assistance to 12 owner-occupied households, and an additional seven owner-occupied households received rehabilitation assistance, one household was provided homeownership assistance, and 10 households will receive emergency monthly housing payment assistance as a means to prevent homelessness. Conneaut will use a portion of their Community Housing Improvement Program (CHIP) funds to target the Community Housing Improvement Strategy areas 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13.

SFY 2011

Ashtabula Homeless Shelter, Inc. received a \$7,600 grant to operate Samaritan House, a 14-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single men, women and families in Ashtabula County. Discretionary funds were used to replace and repair broken steps, handrails and sidewalks. Funds were also used to purchase and install a steel security door and a storm door. The program served 65 households consisting of 153 people.

Catholic Charities Housing Opportunities received a \$115,000 grant to provide down payment assistance and homebuyer counseling to households at or below 50 percent of area median income in Ashtabula, Columbiana, Mahoning, Portage, Stark and Trumbull counties. Down payment assistance may not exceed \$3,000 per unit. Down payment assistance is limited to 3 percent of the purchase price plus out-of-pocket purchase expenses. The Down Payment Assistance Program served 36 households consisting of 90 people. The Homebuyer Counseling program served 180 households consisting of 450 people.

Athens County

Athens County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Appalachian Center For Economic Networks, Inc. (ACEnet) received a \$60,000 grant to assist low- and moderate-income people in their efforts to establish or expand microenterprises through a combination of classes, workshops and counseling. ACEnet will couple the training provided with the opportunity to access direct and working capital loans for people who do not qualify for traditional business credit.

Hocking, Athens, Perry Community Action received a \$175,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Athens, Hocking and Perry counties. The program will serve 35 households consisting of 98 people.

Integrated Services of Appalachian Ohio, Inc. received a \$255,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance, including financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services, to homeless people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income in Athens, Gallia, Hocking, Jackson, Meigs, Perry and Vinton counties. The program will serve 30 households consisting of 72 people. Integrated Services of Appalachian Ohio will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Athens, Gallia, Hocking, Jackson, Meigs, Perry, and Vinton counties. The program will serve 20 households consisting of 48 people.

Three Rivers Housing Corporation, Inc. received a \$700,000 loan for McArthur Senior Living Apartments, a non-housing credit rental project that involves constructing four single-story buildings with 12 garden-style units located in the village of McArthur, Vinton County. All units will be restricted to households 55 years of age and older. Three units will be affordable to and occupied by households at or below 35 percent of the area median gross income; five units will be affordable to and occupied by households at or below 50 percent of the area median gross income; and the remaining four units will be affordable to and occupied by households at or below 60 percent of the area median gross income. The Ohio Housing Finance Agency will be monitoring eight assisted units. Three Rivers Housing Corporation will provide a service coordinator to help residents access the services they need.

SFY 2012

Appalachian Center For Economic Networks, Inc. (ACEnet) received a \$60,000 grant to provide training, technical assistance, financing, and incubation space to Microentrepreneurs in Ohio's 32-county Appalachian region. ACEnet focuses on the food, agriculture, art, retail, technology and manufacturing sectors. The grant was used primarily to fund the comprehensive training and technical assistance programs offered by ACEnet.

Good Works, Inc. received a \$128,100 grant to operate Timothy House, a 13-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single men, women and families. Supportive services include assessment, case management, referrals to community service providers and permanent housing placement in Athens County. The agency provided shelter and supportive services to 250 households consisting of 342 people.

Hocking, Athens, Perry Community Action received a \$107,800 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 18 households consisting of 45 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to three households consisting of seven people. A key partner in providing services

was Integrated Services of Appalachian Ohio. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Athens, Hocking and Perry counties.

Integrated Services of Appalachian Ohio, Inc. received a \$147,300 grant to operate an average of 10 scattered-site transitional housing units per night and provide supportive services to homeless single men, women and families with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Athens and Hocking counties. Seventy percent of program participants had a severe mood dysregulation (SMD) or serious emotional disturbance (SED) diagnosis. Supportive services included case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and permanent housing placement. The program served 45 households consisting of 97 people.

SFY 2011

Appalachian Center For Economic Networks, Inc. (AceNet) received a \$60,000 grant to provide training and technical assistance to 200 households and loans seven business start ups.

Buckeye Hills-Hocking Valley Regional Development District received a \$500,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Athens, Hocking, Meigs, Monroe, Morgan, Noble, Perry and Washington counties. The program served 150 households consisting of 195 people.

Hocking, Athens, Perry Community Action received a \$200,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Athens, Hocking and Perry counties. The program served 50 households consisting of 140 people. **Three Rivers Housing Corporation, Inc.** received a \$500,000 loan for Pontalba II, a new construction development for seniors and the mobility disabled located in The Plains, Athens County. The property consists of two triplex buildings, with six one-bedroom units. Two units will be affordable to households at or below 35 percent of area median gross income; three units will be affordable to households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income; and one unit will be affordable to households at or below 60 percent of area median gross income. The Ohio Housing Finance Agency will monitor four units receiving Housing Development Assistance Program funds. All units will be disabled accessible and include extra storage space outside. Amenities will include ceiling fans, wrought iron windows and dishwashers. Washer and dryer hookups are included in each unit, however, there is one laundry room built into each triplex.

Auglaize County

Auglaize County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Auglaize County Commissioners received a \$105,500 grant to provide 10 low- and moderate-income homeowners with repair assistance, and an additional eight low- and moderate-income owner-occupied households will be provided rehabilitation assistance.

Lima/Allen Council On Community Affairs received a \$187,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance, including financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services, to homeless families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income in Allen, Auglaize and Mercer counties. The program will serve 30 households consisting of 90 people. The key partner in providing assistance is Sources Community Network Services. In addition, Lima Allen Council on Community Affairs will provide homelessness prevention assistance, including financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services, to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Allen, Auglaize and Mercer counties. The program will serve 41 households consisting of 123 people. The key partner in providing assistance is Sources Community Network Services.

PSA 3 Agency on Aging, Inc. received a \$40,400 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Allen, Auglaize, Hancock, Hardin, Mercer, Putnam and Van Wert counties. The program will serve 25 households consisting of 40 people.

SFY 2012

SOURCES Community Network Services received a \$62,300 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance to 45 households consisting of 126 people. In addition, the agency will provide rapid re-housing services through financial assistance to 15 households consisting of 42 people. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Auglaize, Mercer and Van Wert counties.

SFY 2011

Auglaize County Commissioners received a \$64,000 grant to provide private owner rehabilitation assistance to nine low- and moderate-income households, two of which will be completed in the St. Marys Investment target area. Home repair was provided to six households with incomes at or below 50 percent of area median income, two of which were completed in the target area.

PSA 3 Agency on Aging, Inc. received a \$130,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs for homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Allen, Auglaize, Hardin, Hancock, Mercer, Putnam and Van Wert counties. The program served 60 households consisting of 80 people.

Area Agency on Aging, Region 9, Incorporated received a \$160,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Belmont, Carroll, Coshocton, Guernsey, Harrison, Holmes, Jefferson, Muskingum and Tuscarawas counties. The program will serve 42 households consisting of 54 people.

G. M. N. Tri-County Community Action Committee received a \$419,100 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance, including financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services, to homeless households who are below 30 percent of area median income in Belmont, Guernsey, Monroe and Noble counties. The program will serve 184 households consisting of 552 people. The key partner in providing assistance is Crossroads Counseling Services. In addition, G.M.N. Tri-County Community Action Committee will provide homelessness prevention assistance, including financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services, to households who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Belmont, Guernsey, Monroe and Noble counties. The program will serve 35 households consisting of 102 people. The key partner in providing assistance is Crossroads Counseling Services.

SFY 2012

The Salvation Army received a \$282,500 grant to operate a 28-bed emergency shelter serving men, women and families in Belmont County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program served 250 households consisting of 500 people.

The Salvation Army received a \$59,500 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 96 households consisting of 384 people in Belmont County. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 46 households consisting of 184 people. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Belmont County.

SFY 2011

Area Agency on Aging, Region 9, Incorporated received a \$160,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs for homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Belmont, Carroll, Coshocton, Guernsey, Harrison, Holmes, Jefferson, Muskingum and Tuscarawas counties. The program served 40 households consisting of 50 people.

Crossroads Counseling Services, Inc. received a \$95,000 grant to operate an average of 17 supportive housing units for homeless men, women, and families recovering from chemical dependency who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Belmont, Harrison and Monroe counties. Grant funds were not used for drug/alcohol treatment. The program served 60 households consisting of 80 people.

Adams and Brown Counties Economic Opportunities, Inc. received a \$60,000 grant to provide Business Plan Writing classes to 67 participants. The grantee projects that 56 participants will complete the course that includes Quickbooks, Microsoft Excel and Microsoft Word classes, Business Insurance Workshop, and various other workshops. The grantee has also requested to use \$52,000 of their Revolving Loan Fund.

The scope of work will include the adding a security camera system, updating all units with new kitchen, baths, floor covering, appliances, and mechanicals.

Area Agency on Aging District 7, Inc. received a \$315,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Adams, Brown, Gallia, Highland, Jackson, Lawrence, Pike, Ross, Scioto and Vinton counties. The program will serve 65 households consisting of 90 people.

The Community Action Committee of Pike County received a \$210,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income in Adams, Brown, Pike, Scioto, and Lawrence counties. The program will serve 152 households consisting of 570 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Adams-Brown Counties Economic Opportunities, Inc.; Ironton Lawrence Community Action Organization; and Scioto Christian Ministry, Inc. In addition, Community Action Committee of Pike County, Inc. will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Adams, Brown, Pike, Scioto, and Lawrence counties. The program will serve 99 households consisting of 371 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Adams-Brown Counties Economic Opportunities, Inc.; Ironton Lawrence Community Action Organization; and Scioto Christian Ministry, Inc.

SFY 2012

Adams and Brown Counties Economic Opportunities, Inc. received a \$63,400 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 45 households consisting of 135 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 15 households consisting of 23 people. Key partners in providing services were Adams County Shelter for the Homeless and Brown County Metropolitan Housing. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Adams and Brown counties.

Adams and Brown Counties Economic Opportunities, Inc. received a \$60,000 grant to provide educational and business credit opportunities to aspiring entrepreneurs in Adams and Brown counties. This was accomplished through a business education curriculum and one-on-

one technical assistance. People who successfully completed the curriculum were eligible to apply for financing through the ABC micro loan program.

People Working Cooperatively, Inc. received a \$600,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Butler, Clermont, Greene, Hamilton, Montgomery, Preble and Warren counties. Home repairs in Montgomery, Greene and Preble counties will target people age 60 and older. The program will serve 256 households consisting of 553 people.

Warren Metropolitan Housing Authority received a \$548,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income in Butler, Clermont and Warren counties. The program will serve 110 households consisting of 212 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Community Development Professionals, LLC; Clermont County Community Services; and Lifespan. In addition, Warren Metropolitan Housing Authority will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Butler, Clermont and Warren counties. The program will serve 156 households consisting of 335 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Community Development Professionals, LLC; Clermont County Community Services; and Lifespan.

SFY 2012

Butler County Housing And Homeless Coalition received a \$184,600 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 45 households consisting of 60 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 35 households consisting of 45 people. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Butler County.

Council on Aging of Southwestern Ohio received a \$500,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Butler, Clermont, Clinton, Hamilton and Warren counties. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 56 households consisting of 224 people.

People Working Cooperatively, Inc. received an \$800,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs/disabled accessibility modifications for homeowners who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Butler, Clermont, Hamilton and Warren counties. The program served 475 households consisting of 1,045 people.

The program will serve 51 households consisting of 102 people. Interfaith Hospitality Network of Springfield received a \$141,300 grant to provide 22 units of transitional housing and services for homeless, single men, women and families with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Clark County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 45 households consisting of 100 people.

SFY 2012

Interfaith Hospitality Network of Springfield received a \$205,100 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 36 households consisting of 72 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 48 households consisting of 96 people. A key provider in providing services was the United Way Information and Referral. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Clark County.

Neighborhood Housing Partnership of Greater Springfield, Inc. received an \$80,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Clark County. The program served 22 households consisting of 66 people.

Daybreak, Inc. provided 54 units of supportive housing and services for homeless single young adult from 17 to 21 years old and young adults with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Montgomery County.

Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 24 months. The program served 70 households consisting of 95 people.

Hospitality Network of Springfield received a \$141,800 grant to operate an emergency shelter for homeless men. The agency is in the process of renovating a facility in order to move its Men's Shelter to a more appropriate location. Discretionary funds were used for the second phase of the renovation resulting in a 36-bed emergency shelter. Funds were used to install a heating, ventilation and air conditioning system, sprinkler system, update plumbing, bring electrical up to code, replace windows and install carpeting and tile. The program served 190 households/people.

Interfaith Hospitality Network of Springfield received a \$49,600 grant to operate a 15-bed emergency shelter serving homeless men. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 200 households/people. Supportive services include case management, goal planning, referrals to community organizations and permanent housing placement. The program served 350 households consisting of 750 people. Interfaith Hospitality Network of Springfield provided 22 units of supportive housing and services for homeless people and families who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Clark County. Supportive services included case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments, and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of assistance is 24 months. The program served 34 households consisting of 130 people.

Warren Metropolitan Housing Authority received a \$548,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income in Butler, Warren, and Clermont counties. The program will serve 110 households consisting of 212 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Community Development Professionals, LLC; Clermont County Community Services; and Lifespan. In addition, Warren Metropolitan Housing Authority will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Butler, Warren, and Clermont counties. The program will serve 156 households consisting of 335 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Community Development Professionals, LLC; Clermont County Community Services; and Lifespan.

SFY 2012

Clermont Counseling Center received a \$243,800 grant to provide permanent supportive housing to homeless, severely mentally disabled single men, women, and families with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Clermont County. Grant funds were used to support housing operations and rental assistance. The program served 20 households consisting of 28 people.

Clermont Counseling Center received a \$59,800 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 10 households consisting of 13 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 14 households consisting of 25 people. A key partner in providing services was the Clermont County Community Services. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Clermont County.

Clermont County Community Services, Inc. received a \$231,000 grant to operate a 38-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families and people in Clermont County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 1,000 households consisting of 1,200 people.

Council on Aging of Southwestern Ohio received a \$500,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Butler, Clermont, Clinton, Hamilton and Warren counties. Council on Aging of Southwestern Ohio received a \$500,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Butler, Clermont, Clinton, Hamilton and Warren counties. The program served 147 households consisting of 176 people.

SFY 2011

Clinton County Services for the Homeless, Inc. received a \$190,000 grant to operate a 34-bed emergency shelter serving homeless men, women and families. Supportive services provided include case management, goal planning, referrals to community service providers, and placement in permanent housing. The program served 405 households consisting of 520 people.

Columbiana County

Columbiana County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Catholic Charities Housing Opportunities received a \$98,000 grant to provide down payment assistance and pre-sale and post-sale homebuyer counseling to households at or below 65 percent of area median income in Ashtabula, Columbiana, Mahoning, Portage, Stark and Trumbull counties. Maximum assistance may not exceed \$3,000 per unit. Down payment assistance is limited to 3 percent of the purchase price plus out-of-pocket purchase expenses. The Down Payment Assistance Program will serve 30 households consisting of 70 people. The counseling program will serve 120 households consisting of 280 people.

City of East Liverpool received a \$93,000 grant to provide rental subsidies to three households at or below 50 percent of area median income. Rental rehabilitation assistance will be provided to local landlords to rehabilitate two properties to be rented to low- and moderate-income households. Home repair assistance will be provided to 10 very low income owner-occupied homes, and an additional four owner-occupied homes will be provided rehabilitation assistance. Homeownership assistance will be provided to two low- and moderate-income renter households, and counseling will be provide to 28 households.

City of Salem received a \$78,000 grant to provide four low- and moderate-income owner-occupied households with rehabilitation assistance, and an additional eight owner-occupied households will be provided home repair assistance to households with incomes at or below 50 percent of area median income. Rental subsidy assistance will be provided to three households with incomes at or below 50 percent of area median income. Homeownership assistance will be provided to three low- and moderate-income renter households to purchase and rehabilitate a home, and 28 households will be provided homeowner counseling. In cooperation with Habitat for Humanity, two units will be constructed.

The facility provides affordable housing and supportive services for people with severe and persistent mental illness and a history of homelessness.

Columbiana County Mental Health Clinic received a \$40,000 grant to operate a six-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single men and women in Columbiana County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers, and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 80 people.

Columbiana County Mental Health Clinic received a \$76,093 for the West Sixth Street property, a single-family, two-bedroom home with a basement built in 1936. Although minor repairs and roof repairs have been done to this home, there are other repairs still needed to provide for structural soundness and will assist in the reduction of energy consumption and utility costs. East Washington Street is a duplex with one efficiency and one one-bedroom unit built in 1930. In the past year, all but the front foundation wall in the basement has been rebuilt, and the dirt floor has been concreted. The front porch was replaced and thresholds in the main entrances have been repaired. Both properties were purchased by the Counseling Center in 1991 and house formerly homeless people with severe illness.

Community Action Agency of Columbiana County, Inc. received a \$55,000 grant to continue its long running Microenterprise Business Development program. The program includes a three component training framework that includes an online self-directed component, one-on-one counseling, and business plan development. Successful graduates of the program will be eligible to apply for a Micro Loan of up to \$15,000 over a five-year term. The Columbiana

County Board of Commissioners are contributing a \$17,000 grant toward the program, which coordinates with the Trumbull, Mahoning and Columbiana counties One-Stop Center.

Community Action Agency of Columbiana County, Inc. received a \$676,900 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless households who are below 30 percent of area median income in Carroll, Columbiana, Jefferson, Harrison and Tuscarawas counties. The program will serve 154 households consisting of 364 people. The key partners in providing assistance are the Jefferson County Community Action Council and Harcatus Tri-County Community Action Organization. In addition, the Community Action Agency of Columbiana County will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to households who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Carroll, Columbiana, Jefferson, Harrison and Tuscarawas counties. The program will serve 125 households consisting of 300 people. The key partners in providing assistance are the Jefferson County Community Action Council and Harcatus Tri-County Community Action Organization.

SFY 2012

City of East Palestine received an \$83,000 grant to provide seven owner-occupied households with rehabilitation assistance. An additional nine owner-occupied households were provided home repair assistance and homeownership assistance was provided to two low- and moderate-income households. East Palestine used a portion of their Community Housing Improvement Program (CHIP) funds to target the Market South area of the city.

Columbiana County Mental Health Clinic received a \$215,700 grant to provide permanent supportive housing to homeless people and families at or below 35 percent of area median income in Columbiana County who have been diagnosed with severe and persistent mental illness. Program participants were housed in 16 scattered-site units. Six units were designated for young adults from 16 to 23 years old. Grant funds were not be used to pay for mental health treatment. The program served 25 households consisting of 29 people.

Community Action Agency of Columbiana County, Inc. received a \$127,400 grant to operate a 10-bed emergency homeless shelter serving homeless people and families in Columbiana County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, and placement in permanent housing. The program served 129 households consisting of 190 people.

Community Action Agency of Columbiana County, Inc. received a \$101,000 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 76 households consisting of 114 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 45 households consisting of 67 people. A key partner in providing services was the Columbiana County Mental Health dba The Counseling Center. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Columbiana County.

Community Action Agency of Columbiana County, Inc. received a \$49,500 grant to continue its Microenterprise program in partnership with the Trumbull, Mahoning and Columbiana counties One-Stop. The program fills a gap in the county with high unemployment and few options for business startup funding. The agency utilized a combination of online training and one-on-one counseling. Micro financing opportunities were offered to people who complete the Community Action Agency training program.

Community Action Agency of Columbiana County, Inc. received a \$95,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who are at or below

35 percent of area median income in Columbiana County. The program served 28 households consisting of 42 people.

SFY 2011

Catholic Charities Housing Opportunities received a \$115,000 grant to provide down payment assistance and homebuyer counseling to households at or below 50 percent of area median income in Ashtabula, Columbiana, Mahoning, Portage, Stark and Trumbull counties. Down payment assistance did not exceed \$3,000 per unit. Down payment assistance was limited to 3 percent of the purchase price plus out-of-pocket purchase expenses. The Down Payment Assistance Program served 36 households consisting of 90 people. The Homebuyer Counseling Program served 180 households consisting of 450 people.

City of East Liverpool received a \$58,000 grant to provide private-owner rehabilitation assistance to four low- and moderate-income households, all of which were completed in the East End target area. Home repair assistance was provided to seven low- and moderate-income households. Homeownership assistance was provided to five low- and moderate-income homebuyers to purchase affordable housing. Tenant-based rental assistance was provided to four tenant households with incomes at or below 60 percent of area median income.

Coshocton County

Coshocton County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Area Agency on Aging, Region 9, Incorporated received a \$160,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Belmont, Carroll, Coshocton, Guernsey, Harrison, Holmes, Jefferson, Muskingum and Tuscarawas counties. The program will serve 42 households consisting of 54 people.

Community Action Commission of the Lancaster Fairfield County Area received a \$94,400 grant to operate a 16-bed emergency shelter serving homeless households with children in Fairfield County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers, and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 65 households consisting of 163 people. Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action Agency will provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income in Coshocton, Fairfield, Holmes, Knox and Licking counties. The program will serve 106 households consisting of 265 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Licking County Coalition for Housing; Salvation Army-Newark; Behavioral Healthcare Partners of Central Ohio, Inc.; and Kno-Ho-Co-Ashland Community Action Agency. In addition, the Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action Agency will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Coshocton, Fairfield, Holmes, Knox and Licking counties. The program will serve 170 households consisting of 425 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Licking County Coalition for Housing; Salvation Army-Newark; Behavioral Healthcare Partners of Central Ohio, Inc.; and Kno-Ho-Co-Ashland Community Action Agency.

Kno-Ho-Co-Ashland Community Action Commission received a \$175,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Knox, Holmes, Coshocton and Ashland counties. The program will serve 24 households consisting of 100 people.

Kno-Ho-Co-Ashland Community Action Commission received a \$241,900 grant to operate emergency shelters serving homeless households with children in Knox, Coshocton and Ashland counties. Combined, the shelters contain 26 beds. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 70 households consisting of 210 people.

SFY 2012

Kno-Ho-Co-Ashland Community Action Commission received a \$69,100 grant to provide rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 15 households consisting of 50 people. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Coshocton and Holmes counties.

SFY 2011

Area Agency on Aging, Region 9, Inc., received a \$160,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs for homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Belmont, Carroll, Coshocton, Guernsey, Harrison, Holmes, Jefferson, Muskingum and Tuscarawas counties. The program served 40 households consisting of 50 people.

Kno-Ho-Co-Ashland Community Action Commission received a \$170,000 grant to operate a 12-bed emergency shelter serving homeless men, women and families. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 85 households consisting of 275 people.

Crawford County

Crawford County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Findlay Hope House for the Homeless, Inc. received a \$202,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income in Crawford, Hancock, Hardin, Marion, Putnam and Wyandot counties. The program will serve 30 households consisting of 70 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Marion Area Counseling Center, Inc. and Hancock-Hardin-Wyandot-Putnam Community Action Commission, Inc. In addition, Findlay Hope House for the Homeless, Inc. will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Crawford, Hancock, Hardin, Putnam, Marion and Wyandot counties. The program will serve 75 households consisting of 165 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Marion Area Counseling Center, Inc. and Hancock-Hardin-Wyandot-Putnam Community Action Commission, Inc.

Ohio District 5 Area Agency on Aging, Inc., received an \$800,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners from 18 to 59 years old with disabilities and homeowners age 60 and older. Households served by the program will be at or below 50 percent of area median income in Ashland, Crawford, Huron, Knox, Marion, Morrow, Richland, Seneca and Wyandot counties. The program will serve 240 households consisting of 360 people.

SFY 2012

The Marion Area Counseling Center, Inc., received an \$82,200 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 55 households consisting of 130 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 21 households consisting of 52 people. Key partners in providing services were Ohio Heartland Community Action Agency and Metropolitan Housing Authority. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Crawford and Marion counties.

SFY 2011

Ohio District 5 Area Agency on Aging, Inc., received an \$800,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Ashland, Crawford, Huron, Knox, Marion, Morrow, Richland, Seneca and Wyandot counties. The program served 240 households consisting of 360 people.

Cuyahoga County

Cuyahoga County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

AIDS Taskforce of Greater Cleveland, Inc. received a \$178,500 grant to provide 48 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled single men, women and families with children with HIV/AIDS who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program will serve 70 households consisting of 78 people. It is projected that 95 percent of households will stay six months or longer.

Burten, Bell, Carr Development, Inc., received a \$75,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Cleveland. The program will serve 44 people consisting of 130 people.

Cleveland Housing Network, Inc., received a \$150,000 grant to provide down payment assistance and pre- and post-sale homebuyer counseling to households at or below 65 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. Maximum assistance may not exceed \$3,000 per unit. Down payment assistance is limited to 3 percent of the purchase price plus out-of-pocket purchase expenses. The program will serve 75 households consisting of 187 people.

Cogswell Hall, Inc., received a \$39,200 grant to provide 14 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled single men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program will serve 14 households/people. The program projects that 100 percent of households will stay six months or longer.

Domestic Violence and Child Advocacy Center received a \$106,000 grant to provide four units of transitional housing and services for homeless men, women and households with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. Supportive services include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers, and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 56 households consisting of 122 people.

Emerald Development and Economic Network, Inc.,(EDEN) received a \$250,000 loan for property built in 1928. The West 116th Apartments is a two-story, six-unit multi-family building with a basement. All units are designated for people of very low income with a diagnosis of mental illness. Using capital funds from the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services, EDEN, Inc. purchased the property in 1992 and has operated at 100 percent occupancy since the time of purchase. EDEN has been active in serving homeless and low-income communities in Cleveland since 1991. They own and operate more than 80 facilities with more than 300 scattered-site units. A majority of their residents are diagnosed with a severe and persistent mental illness. EDEN's facilities include rental housing, congregate living facilities, and mental health consumer drop-in centers.

Emerald Development and Economic Network, Inc. (EDEN) received a \$2,139,200 loan to provide 464 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled single men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program will serve 474 people. It is projected that 96 percent of households will stay six months or longer.

Famicos Foundation received a \$174,000 grant to provide 44 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled single men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations

and supportive services. The program will serve 44 households/people. The program projects that 100 percent of households will stay six months or longer.

Family Promise of Greater Cleveland received an \$87,600 grant to operate a 24-bed emergency shelter serving homeless households with children in Cuyahoga County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers, and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 100 households consisting of 300 people.

Family Promise of Greater Cleveland received a \$132,900 grant to provide 14 units of transitional housing and services for homeless households with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers, and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 120 households consisting of 380 people.

Lakewood Senior Citizens received a \$1,000,000 loan for Westery III, a multi-family bond and housing credit project that involved acquiring and rehabilitating a 15-story elevated building with 179 one-bedroom units and two manager units in the city of Lakewood, Cuyahoga County. All units will be restricted to senior residents age 55 and older. Eighteen units will be affordable to and occupied by households at 30 percent of the area median gross income; 72 will be at 50 percent of the area median gross income; and the remaining 87 units will be at 60 percent of the area median gross income. Twenty-six of the units operate under a project-based Section 8 Housing Assistance Payment contract. The Ohio Housing Finance Agency will monitor 13 assisted units. Rehabilitation will include complete replacement of finishes and building systems to maximize energy efficiency.

Lutheran Metropolitan Ministry received a \$186,900 grant to operate a 365-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single males in Cuyahoga County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers, and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 7,800 people.

Magnolia on Detroit Apartments received a \$650,000 loan to acquire and rehabilitate a housing community for families in Cleveland, Cuyahoga County. The project consists of a housing credit, rental development for families that involves rehabilitating 126 flat-style units in six three-story buildings. Thirteen units will be affordable to households at or below 35 percent of area median gross income; 63 units will be affordable to households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income; and 50 units will be affordable to households at or below 60 percent of area median gross income. The Ohio Housing Finance Agency will monitor six assisted units. All units will be upgraded with through-wall air conditioners, energy efficient appliances, new carpet/floor coverings, and new windows and doors. Each kitchen will have walls removed to create more livable space. A new community building will be constructed and 37 more parking spaces added to the property.

Neighborhood Housing Services of Greater Cleveland, Inc., received a \$120,000 loan for the South Euclid Land Trust Homes, a non-housing credit, homeownership project that involved acquiring and rehabilitation four scattered-site, single-family homes in the city of South Euclid, Cuyahoga County. All homes will be sold to qualified buyers at or below 80 percent of the area median gross income. All four homes are Cape Cod bungalow style and will have three bedrooms, two baths, a basement, and a garage. The scope of work is significant for each home and will include replacing roofs, siding, windows, heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems and water heaters. An asbestos abatement is also needed. The interiors will be completely updated to include drywall repair and painting, carpet and flooring repair or replacement, and complete bathroom and kitchen updates.

The Salvation Army of Greater Cleveland received a \$400,000 grant to provide 33 units of transitional housing and services for homeless single men who are recovering from alcohol/drug addiction and are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers, and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 270 people.

The Young Women`s Christian Association of Greater Cleveland received a \$179,500 grant to provide 22 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless disabled youth and their children from ages 18 to 24 who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program will serve 28 households consisting of 38 people. The program projects that 92 percent of households will stay six months or longer.

SFY 2012

Cleveland Housing Network, Inc., received a \$100,000 grant to provide 40 scattered-site units of permanent supportive housing for homeless people and families with a disability who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. The program served 58 households consisting of 190 people.

Community Housing Solutions received an \$800,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. The program served 267 households and 530 people.

Joseph's Home received a \$50,300 grant to provide 11 units of facility-based supportive housing to homeless men who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County who have medical conditions that require ongoing care. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The program served 65 households/people.

Kingsbury Tower I, Ltd. received a \$1,000,000 loan for Kingsbury Tower Apartments, a housing credit rental development that involves rehabilitating one nine-story building and four two-story buildings located in Cleveland, Cuyahoga County. Fifty-two units were affordable at or below 35 percent of area median gross income, and 77 units were affordable at or below 60 percent of area median gross income. The Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored 11 assisted units. Exterior improvements to the buildings included new paving, security fencing, landscaping, roofs, entrances and facades. Interior improvements included replacing mechanical systems and modernizing the elevator systems. Individual units have new bathrooms, kitchens and appliances as needed. Residents also benefited from renovated common areas and laundry rooms.

Mental Health Services For Homeless People, Inc., received a \$480,000 grant to operate the 137-bed Norma Herr Shelter for homeless women in Cuyahoga County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 3,200 people. Mental Health Services for Homeless People operates North Point, a 160-bed, facility-based supportive housing facility serving homeless single men who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The program served 320 households/people. Mental Health Services for Homeless People will also operate Safe Haven 2, an 18-unit, facility-based supportive housing program serving unaccompanied homeless young men and women from ages 18 to 26 who are at or below 35 percent of area median income. Supportive services include case coordination and placement in permanent housing. The program served 62 people.

Saint Lukes Housing Partnership LLC received a \$210,812 loan for Saint Luke's Manor Phase II, a housing credit multi-family rental development for seniors that involves the adaptive reuse of a three-story building located in Cleveland, Cuyahoga County. Phase II provided 65 total units. Seven units were affordable to households at or below 35 percent of area median gross income, 33 units were affordable to households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income, and 25 units were affordable to households at or below 60 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored two assisted units. This is the second phase of the historic renovation of the former Saint Luke's hospital located in the Buckeye neighborhood of Cleveland. Phase One of the project received tax credits in 2009 and includes 72 senior housing units.

Transitional Housing, Inc., received a \$299,100 grant to provide 10 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless women with a disability and their children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. The program served 10 households consisting of 12 people. Transitional Housing Inc. provided 51 facility-based units of supportive housing to homeless women and their children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 230 households consisting of 266 people.

University Settlement, Inc., received a \$250,100 grant to provide an average of 20 units of scattered-site supportive housing to homeless families with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The program served 60 households consisting of 180 people.

Vesta Regency, LLC received a \$525,000 loan for Regency Square Apartments, a housing credit rental development that involves acquiring and rehabilitating an existing multi-family building in Cleveland, Cuyahoga County. The three large adjoining apartment buildings, on 1.06 acres, have four stories and 66 units. All apartments were affordable to households with incomes at or below 60 percent of the area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored five Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units. The rehab included upgrades to the site, such as removing any environmental/asbestos material, replacing ceramic wall tile, carpet, vinyl composition tile flooring, kitchen cabinets and countertops, bath vanities, entry doors/frames and, selected interior doors/frames. New hardwire combination smoke/carbon monoxide detectors were installed to each unit. The window air conditioning were removed.

YMCA of Greater Cleveland received a \$183,800 grant to operate Y-Haven, a 108-bed facility-based supportive housing program serving homeless men at or below 35 percent of area median income who are recovering from drug/alcohol addiction in Cuyahoga County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals and placement in permanent housing. Grant funds were not be used for alcohol/drug treatment. The program served 420 people.

SFY 2011

AIDS Taskforce of Greater Cleveland, Inc., received a \$178,500 grant to operate a 39-unit permanent supportive housing program for homeless people diagnosed with HIV/AIDS who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. The program served 45 households consisting of 150 people.

Burten, Bell, Carr Development, Inc., received a \$350,000 loan for St. John's Village West Family Homes, a scattered-site, lease-purchase housing credit development for families that involves constructing three- and four-bedroom single family homes located in the Central neighborhood of Cleveland, Cuyahoga County. Four units were affordable to households at or

below 35 percent of area median gross income; 20 units were affordable to households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income; and 16 units were affordable to households at or below 60 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored three assisted units. This development is the final phase of Village Central, completing Cleveland's Homeownership Zone, a HUD demo program which helped catalyze the successful redevelopment of 400 parcels of vacant land into new residential uses.

Burten, Bell, Carr Development, Inc., received a \$75,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Ward 5 of the city of Cleveland. The program served 25 households consisting of 63 people.

Cleveland Housing Network, Inc. received a \$657,300 loan for Opportunity Housing II, a non-housing credit homeownership project which will involve rehabilitating and constructing up to 20 homes within six neighborhoods in Cleveland, Cuyahoga County. This is the second phase of Cleveland Housing Network's program to stabilize and revitalize the six neighborhoods within the Strategic Investment Initiative areas. CHN is nearing completion of the first phase of 50 houses, in which they have sold 21 homes with Housing Development Assistance Program financing and 16 with Neighborhood Stabilization Program-2 funds. Six are currently under contract, five are under construction, and nine are completed and on the market.

Cleveland Housing Network, Inc., received a \$150,000 grant to provide down payment assistance to households at or below 65 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. The program targeted households participating in CHN's Lease Purchase Program, which helps households purchase homes after 15 years of responsible residency. Maximum assistance may not exceed \$3,000 per unit. Down payment assistance is limited to 3 percent of the purchase price plus out-of-pocket purchase expenses. The program served 75 households consisting of 187 people.

Cogswell Hall, Inc. received a \$37,000 grant to operate a 14-unit permanent supportive housing program serving single homeless disabled people who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. Grant funds were used to replace 41 unsafe, deteriorated windows with new windows approved by the Landmarks Commission, as the building is in a designated historic district. The program served 14 people.

Cogswell Hall, Inc. received a \$39,200 grant to provide 14 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless women with a disabling condition who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. The program served 14 people.

Community Housing Solutions received a \$260,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs/accessibility modifications for homeowners who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. The program served 87 households consisting of 170 people.

Domestic Violence and Child Advocacy Center received a \$106,400 grant to operate a six-unit supportive housing program serving homeless women and women with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The program served 62 households consisting of 120 people.

Emerald Development and Economic Network, Inc. received a \$1,561,500 loan to operate 369 units of permanent supportive housing for disabled homeless people who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. Grant funds were used for operating costs at Emerald Commons, The Liberty at St. Clair, South Pointe Commons, Edgewood Park, Northridge Commons and East 75th and Euclid Avenue. The program served 439 people.

Famicos Foundation received a \$47,400 grant to install 15 security cameras, replace inoperable or poor light fixtures and install 10 locking cabinets for fire extinguishers at the 44-unit permanent supportive housing facility for chronically homeless people, located at 1850 Superior Avenue. The project served 55 people.

Famicos Foundation received a \$174,000 grant to operate a 44-unit permanent supportive housing program serving disabled homeless men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. The program served 110 people.

Famicos Foundation received a \$500,000 loan for University Tower, a housing credit multi-family rental development for seniors and the disabled that involves rehabilitating an existing nine-story, 113-unit apartment building located in Cleveland, Cuyahoga County. Twenty-three units were affordable to households at or below 35 percent of area median gross income; 45 units were affordable to households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income; and 38 units were affordable to households at or below 60 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored three Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units. Famicos has owned and operated the property since 2005 and the building is fully occupied, but rehabilitation was necessary to address its functional obsolescence and deterioration due to age. The construction plans included gutting all interior spaces.

Famicos Foundation received a \$160,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs/accessibility modifications for homeowners who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in the Forest Hills, Glenville, Hough and St. Clair-Superior neighborhoods of Cleveland. The program served 107 households consisting of 143 people.

Family Promise of Greater Cleveland received a \$158,600 grant to operate a 24-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families with dependent children. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 100 households consisting of 300 people. Interfaith Hospitality Network of Cleveland operates a 24-unit supportive housing program serving homeless families with dependent children headed by single mothers, single fathers, and couples who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The program served 50 households consisting of 157 people.

Lutheran Metropolitan Ministry received a \$45,500 grant to replace deteriorating heating, ventilation and air conditioning units in a 350-bed emergency shelter serving homeless men in Cleveland. The program will serve 3,000 households/people.

Lutheran Metropolitan Ministry received a \$186,900 grant to operate a 350-bed emergency shelter serving homeless men. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 4,200 people/households.

Mental Health Services for Homeless People, Inc. received a \$63,300 grant to operate the Norma Herr Women's Center (NHWC), a 135-bed emergency shelter serving homeless women and children in Cuyahoga County. The agency also operates the North Point Transitional Housing program serving homeless men. Funds were used to install necessary security equipment that includes installing six security doors with communications panels, panic buttons, front door camera and intercom; video alarm and monitoring system and two-way radios to give staff the ability to communicate in the 24,000-square-foot facility. Mental Health Services also

installed video recorders at North Point Transitional Housing to address security concerns. The program served 1,660 households consisting of 2,232 people.

New Life Community received a \$212,900 grant to provide 13 units of supportive housing with services to homeless women and their children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to community service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. Maximum length of stay in the program is four months. The program served 80 households consisting of 280 people. New Life Community also operates a supportive housing program designed to rapidly re-house families at or below 35 percent of area median income who are exiting from emergency shelter. The program served 36 households consisting of 100 people.

The Salvation Army received a \$45,200 grant to operate the Zelma George Emergency Shelter for homeless women and their children and the PASS Transitional Housing program for homeless men. Grant funds were used to install mag locks, relays and smoke detectors, upgrade the fire system, and install new external doors. The programs served 354 households consisting of 879 people.

The Salvation Army received a \$400,000 grant to operate a 33-bed emergency shelter serving homeless women and families in Cuyahoga County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 350 households consisting of 1,000 people. Salvation Army Cleveland provided supportive housing and services for homeless men who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 24 months. The program served 270 people.

The Young Women`s Christian Association of Greater Cleveland received a \$179,500 grant to provide 22 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless young women between ages 18 and 24 who have aged out of foster care, have a disabling condition, and are at or below 35 percent of area median income. The program served 50 households consisting of 57 people.

Volunteers of America of Greater Ohio received a \$20,000 grant to operate a 26-bed emergency shelter for homeless men in Cuyahoga County. Discretionary funds were used to replace cracked roof rafters and to relocate the shelter entrance which was in an open, unprotected area that poses a security risk for shelter residents and staff. The Volunteers of America installed a four-foot wall with a glassed-in top so that only authorized people and inspected packages can gain access to the reception area. The project included installing electronic security doors. The program served 350 people.

West Side Catholic Center received a \$407,500 grant to operate a 60-unit supportive housing program serving homeless people and families who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Cuyahoga County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 16 months. The program served 155 households consisting of 415 people.

Darke County

Darke County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Community Action Partnership of the Greater Dayton Area received an \$86,200 grant to operate an eight-bed emergency shelter serving homeless, single men and women and families with children in Darke County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 115 households consisting of 175 people. The program will also operate a 15-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single men, women and families with children in Preble County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 190 households consisting of 285 people.

Community Housing of Darke, Miami and Shelby Counties, Inc. received a \$210,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance to homeless people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income in Champaign, Darke, Logan, Miami, Preble and Shelby counties through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services. The program will serve 89 households consisting of 178 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Family Abuse Shelter of Miami County, Shelby County Metropolitan Housing Authority, Tri-County Community Action CLS and Community Action Partnership of Greater Dayton. Community Housing of Darke, Miami and Shelby counties will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to men, women and families who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Champaign, Darke, Logan, Miami, Preble and Shelby counties. The program will serve 51 households consisting of 102 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Family Abuse Shelter of Miami County, Shelby County Metropolitan Housing Authority, Tri-County Community Action CLS and Community Action Partnership of Greater Dayton.

Community Housing of Darke, Miami and Shelby Counties, Inc. received a \$111,000 grant to provide six units of transitional housing and services for homeless single men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Darke, Miami and Shelby counties. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 65 households/people.

SFY 2011

Community Action Partnership of the Greater Dayton Area received a \$266,200 grant to operate a 12-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families and people in Darke County and an 11-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families and people in Preble County. Supportive services provided include assessment, case management, referrals to community organizations and permanent housing placement. The Darke County emergency shelter provided shelter and supportive services to 150 households consisting of 300 people. The Preble County emergency shelter provided shelter and supportive services to 49 households consisting of 150 people. Community Action Partnership of Greater Dayton will provide 11 units of supportive housing and services for homeless families and people who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Darke and Greene counties. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 18 months. The Greene County program provided supportive housing and services to 65 people.

Community Housing of Darke, Miami and Shelby Counties, Inc. received a \$13,900 grant to operate a transitional housing program serving homeless, severely mentally disabled people and families in which one member experiences a severe and persistent mental illness in Darke,

Miami and Shelby counties. Transitional housing is provided in scattered site single-family homes. The grant provided funding to complete necessary repairs at three homes operated by the agency. Repairs included replacing and/or repairing basement stairs, damaged walls, kitchen cabinets, a back awning, garage doors and gutters. The program served 21 households consisting of 26 people.

Community Housing of Darke, Miami and Shelby Counties, Inc. received a \$111,000 grant to provide an average of 11 units of supportive housing and services for homeless families and people with mental illness who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Darke, Miami and Shelby counties. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of assistance is 24 months. The program served 30 households consisting of 65 people.

Defiance County

Defiance County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

New Home Development Company, Inc. received a \$758,000 grant to build Upton Heights. This 10-unit permanent supportive housing development located in Defiance County provides affordable housing and supportive services for people with severe and persistent mental illness.

Northwestern Ohio Community Action Commission, Inc. received a \$166,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Paulding, Van Wert and Williams counties. The program will serve 14 households consisting of 37 people. Northwestern Ohio Community Action Commission, Inc. will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Paulding, Van Wert and Williams counties. The program will serve 32 households consisting of 86 people.

Ralston Square Apartments Limited Partnership received a \$750,000 loan for Ralston Square Apartments, a housing credit rental development for families that involves rehabilitating 50 flat-style and townhouse-style units in six two-story buildings located in Defiance, Defiance County. Three units will be affordable to households at or below 35 percent of area median gross income; 17 units will be affordable to households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income; and 30 units will be affordable to households at or below 60 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency will monitor seven assisted units. The units will be furnished with new high-efficiency furnaces, water heaters, flooring, kitchen cabinets, countertops and Energy Star appliances. The property will be upgraded with a new community room addition for residents, and new washers and dryers will be added.

The Ability Center of Greater Toledo received a \$200,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Lucas, Ottawa, Williams and Wood counties. The program will serve 55 people.

SFY 2012

Area Office on Aging of Northwestern Ohio, Inc. received a \$350,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Defiance, Erie, Fulton, Henry, Lucas, Ottawa, Paulding, Sandusky, Williams and Wood counties. The program served 70 households consisting of 91 people.

Northwestern Ohio Community Action Commission, Inc. received a \$150,100 grant to operate a 13-bed emergency shelter for homeless people and families in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Paulding and Williams counties. Supportive services provided include case management, transportation, referrals to community organizations and permanent housing placement. The agency provided shelter and supportive services to 210 households consisting of 300 people.

Northwestern Ohio Community Action Commission, Inc. received a \$74,400 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 35 households consisting of 77 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and

stabilization services to 10 households consisting of 24 people. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Paulding and Williams counties.

Northwestern Ohio Community Action Commission, Inc. received a \$200,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Paulding, Van Wert and Williams counties. The program served 50 households consisting of 75 people.

The Ability Center of Greater Toledo received a \$200,000 grant to provide emergency home/accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Defiance, Henry, Lucas, Fulton, Ottawa, Williams and Wood counties. The program will serve 62 people.

The program will serve 123 households consisting of 373 people. The key partner in providing assistance is the Community Action Organization of Delaware, Madison and Union Counties. Salvation Army through its Rapid Re-housing Ohio Program will provide rapid re-housing assistance to homeless families with at least one minor child who are below 30 percent of area median income in the Ohio Balance of State counties. The program will serve 120 households consisting of 358 people. Salvation Army will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Delaware, Madison, Morrow and Union counties. The program will serve 80 households consisting of 280 people. The key partner in providing assistance is the Community Action Organization of Delaware, Madison and Union Counties.

SFY 2012

Family Promise of Delaware County received a \$54,000 grant to operate an eight-bed emergency shelter program serving homeless families in Delaware County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The program served 83 households consisting of 245 people.

The Community Action Organization of Delaware, Madison and Union Counties received a \$175,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were or below 50 percent of area median income in Delaware, Madison and Union counties. The program served 48 households consisting of 125 people.

The Salvation Army – Columbus Area Services received a \$71,600 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 31 households consisting of 93 people. A key partner in providing services was the Morrow County Department of Job and Family Services. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Delaware and Morrow counties.

The program served 490 households consisting of 1,470 people. The Salvation Army Columbus Rapid Re-Housing Program serves homeless families with at least one dependent child in the Ohio Balance of State counties and homeless youth ages 18 to 23 in Delaware County. The program served 278 households consisting of 814 people.

Community Action Commission of Erie, Huron and Richland Counties, Inc. received a \$140,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Erie, Huron and Richland counties. The program will serve 46 households consisting of 70 people.

Ohio District 5 Area Agency on Aging, Inc. received a \$397,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income in Erie, Huron and Richland counties. The program will serve 46 households consisting of 100 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Catholic Charities – Diocese of Toledo; Harmony House Homeless Services, Inc. and Volunteers of America Northwest Ohio. Ohio District 5 Area Agency on Aging, Inc. will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Erie, Huron and Richland counties. The program will serve 124 households consisting of 310 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Catholic Charities – Diocese of Toledo; Harmony House Homeless Services, Inc. and Volunteers of America Northwest Ohio.

Volunteers of America Northwest Ohio, Inc. received a \$160,000 grant to operate an 18-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single men and women in Erie County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 325 households/people.

Volunteers of America Northwest Ohio, Inc. received a \$57,200 grant to provide 10 units of transitional housing and services for homeless single men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Erie County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 50 people.

SFY 2012

Area Office On Aging of Northwestern Ohio, Inc. received a \$350,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Defiance, Erie, Fulton, Henry, Lucas, Ottawa, Paulding, Sandusky, Williams and Wood counties. The program served 70 households consisting of 91 people.

City of Vermilion received a \$125,000 grant to rehabilitate seven owner-occupied units, an additional 12 owner units received home repair assistance, one low- and moderate-income household received homeownership assistance, and 10 households received emergency monthly housing payment assistance to prevent homelessness. In addition with cooperation from Habitat for Humanity, one unit was constructed to be occupied by a household at or below 65 percent of area median income. Vermilion used a portion of their Community Housing Improvement Program (CHIP) funds to target Community Housing Improvement Strategy areas 6, 7 and 8.

Community Action Commission of Erie, Huron and Richland Counties, Inc. received a \$121,700 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 58 households consisting of 160 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 12 households consisting of 26 people. Key

partners in providing services were Catholic Charities and Volunteers of America Northwest Ohio. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Erie and Huron counties.

Extended Housing, Inc. received a \$950,000 loan for McKinley Grove, a Housing Development Assistance Program-funded, multi-family rental development for people who have experienced long-term homelessness that involves constructing a two-story, 17-unit building located in Painesville, Lake County. Twelve units were affordable to households at or below 35 percent of area median gross income and five units were affordable to households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored six assisted units.

SFY 2011

Community Action Commission of Erie, Huron and Richland Counties, Inc. received an \$80,600 grant to operate a 12-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served nine households consisting of 50 people.

Community Action Commission of Erie, Huron and Richland Counties, Inc. received a \$140,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Erie, Huron and Richland counties. The program served 46 households consisting of 70 people.

Erie County Commissioners received a \$125,000 grant to provide private owner rehabilitation assistance to four low- and moderate-income households, one of which was completed in the target area, home repair assistance was provided to 13 households at or below 50 percent of area median income, two of which were completed in the target area. Homeownership assistance was provided to one low- and moderate-income household, and three units received rental rehabilitation assistance. Emergency monthly housing payments were provided to 15 households, two of which were in the target area, as a means of preventing homelessness. One new home was constructed in conjunction with the local Habitat for Humanity affiliate to benefit a household below 65 percent of area median income.

Volunteers of America Northwest Ohio, Inc. received a \$49,900 grant to operate an emergency shelter for homeless people and families in Erie County. Discretionary funds were used to replace four damaged heating, ventilation and air conditioning units to ensure shelter's heating, ventilation and air conditioning system function long term. Funds were also used to replace 40 windows. The program served 141 households consisting of 346 people.

Volunteers of America Northwest Ohio, Inc. received a \$410,400 grant to operate an 18-bed emergency shelter serving homeless men and women. Supportive services provided include assessment, case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The agency provided shelter and supportive services to 385 people. Volunteers of America (VOA) of Northwest Ohio provided 40 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless disabled people who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Lucas County. Grant funds were used to support housing operations. The program served 45 households/people. VOA of Northwest Ohio provided an average of 36 units of supportive housing for homeless people at or below 35 percent of area median income in Erie County. Supportive services include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 268 households consisting of 368 people.

Fairfield County

Fairfield County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action Agency received a \$175,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Fairfield County. The program will serve 38 households consisting of 87 people.

Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action Agency received a \$750,000 loan for Pearl House, a housing credit permanent supportive housing development that involves constructing 21 two-bedroom units targeting people in substance abuse recovery with children. Five units will be affordable to households with income at or below 35 percent of the area median gross income; eight units will be affordable to households with income at or below 50 percent of the area median gross income; and eight units will be affordable to households with income at or below 60 percent of the area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency will monitor three Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units. The project will have on-site staff and service providers and the project is within walking distance of retail, grocery shopping, employment opportunities and supportive services.

Fairfield County Commissioners received a \$35,000 grant to provide five low- and moderate-income owner-occupied households with rehabilitation assistance, an additional 14 owner-occupied households will receive home repair assistance (two of which will be well or septic repair or replacement). Homeownership assistance will be provided to four low- and moderate-income households, and emergency payment assistance will be provided to eight low- and moderate-income households to avoid eviction, foreclosure or utility disconnection.

Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action Agency received a \$94,400 grant to operate a 16-bed emergency shelter serving homeless households with children in Fairfield County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 65 households consisting of 163 people. Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action Agency will provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income in Coshocton, Fairfield, Holmes, Knox and Licking counties. The program will serve 106 households consisting of 265 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Licking County Coalition for Housing, Salvation Army-Newark, Behavioral Healthcare Partners of Central Ohio Inc. and Kno-Ho-Co-Ashland Community Action Agency. Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action Agency will provide homelessness prevention assistance to people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Coshocton, Fairfield, Holmes, Knox and Licking counties through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services. The program will serve 170 households consisting of 425 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Licking County Coalition for Housing, Salvation Army-Newark, Behavioral Healthcare Partners of Central Ohio Inc., and Kno-Ho-Co-Ashland Community Action Agency.

SFY 2012

Coleman Professional Services, Inc. received a \$125,350 loan for Rutherford House, a permanent supportive housing development which consists of 16 units located in Lancaster, Fairfield County. The project did not utilize housing tax credits. The development included adaptively reusing and historic rehabilitating two buildings. All units were affordable to and occupied by people at 35 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored 10 assisted units. Tenants benefited from having Community Action Program Commission of Lancaster Fairfield's offices and services on site. Tenants also had access to

onsite laundry facilities, secured bicycle storage, common area, indoor and outdoor play areas and a resident association.

Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action Agency received a \$61,600 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 986 households consisting of 2,465 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 438 households consisting of 1,095 people. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Fairfield County.

Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action Agency received a \$1,100,000 grant to rehabilitate Rutherford House. This 16-unit permanent supportive housing development located in Fairfield County provides affordable housing and supportive services for people with a history of homelessness and extremely low income.

Lutheran Social Services of Central Ohio received a \$385,100 grant to operate a 20-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single men and women in Fairfield County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The program served 460 people. Lutheran Social Services provided an average of 58 units of supportive housing to homeless people and families who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Fairfield County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The program served 120 households consisting of 200 people.

SFY 2011

Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action Agency received a \$205,000 grant to operate the LFCAA Emergency Shelter, a 16-bed emergency shelter, serving homeless families. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 48 households consisting of 144 people. The Community Action Program Commission of the Lancaster-Fairfield County Area provided four units of supportive housing and supportive services for homeless families at or below 35 percent of the area median income in Fairfield County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to service providers and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of assistance is 11 months. The program served 18 households consisting of 55 people.

Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action Agency received a \$100,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs/accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Fairfield County. The program served 35 households consisting of 105 people.

Fairfield County Commissioners received a \$96,000 grant to assist nine owner-occupied units with repairs, and provide septic repairs to an additional two households. Homeownership assistance was provided to three households, and an additional six owner-occupied homes received rehabilitation assistance. Emergency monthly housing payments were provided to seven households as a means of homelessness prevention and a planning study of future housing needs was conducted.

Fayette County

Fayette County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Community Action Commission of Fayette County received a \$196,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Fayette, Greene and Ross counties. The program will serve 25 households consisting of 35 people. The agency will provide down payment assistance and pre- and post-sale homebuyer counseling to households at or below 50 percent of area median income in Fayette, Greene and Ross counties. Maximum assistance may not exceed \$3,000 per unit. Down payment assistance is limited to 3 percent of the purchase price plus out-of-pocket purchase expenses. The down payment assistance counseling program will serve 214 households consisting of 442 people.

SFY 2012

Community Action Commission of Fayette County received a \$124,400 grant to operate a 12-bed emergency shelter serving single women and families with children. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The agency provided shelter and supportive service to 100 households consisting of 240 people. The Community Action Commission of Fayette County provided 17 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless single men and women with a disability who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Fayette County. The program served 25 people. The Community Action Commission of Fayette County provided 17 units of facility-based supportive housing for homeless single females and households with children who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Fayette County. Supportive services include referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The program served 80 households consisting of 240 people.

SFY 2011

Community Action Commission of Fayette County received a \$198,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs for homeowners age 60 and older who were at or below 35 percent of area median income. The program served 25 households consisting of 45 people. The Community Action Commission of Fayette County also provided down payment assistance and pre- and post-sale homeownership counseling to households at or below 50 percent of area median income. Maximum assistance may not exceed \$3,000 per unit. Down payment assistance is limited to 3 percent of the purchase price plus out-of-pocket purchase expenses. The Down Payment Assistance Program served 14 households consisting of 42 people.

Fayette County Commissioners received a \$25,000 grant to provide private owner rehabilitation assistance to three low- and moderate-income households, two of which were completed in the village of Jeffersonville target area. Home repair assistance was provided to 12 low- and moderate-income households, five of which were completed in the target area. Two new units were constructed for sale as affordable housing to two low- and moderate-income homebuyers. Tenant-based rental assistance was provided to 20 low- and moderate-income tenant households and emergency monthly housing payments were provided to 20 low- and moderate-income households as a means of preventing homelessness.

Franklin County

Franklin County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Amethyst, Inc. received a \$204,000 grant to provide 92 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled households with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Franklin County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program will serve 210 households and 300 people.

Community Development for All People received a \$45,000 loan for Southside Homeownership II, a non-housing credit homeownership project which will involve rehabilitating up to five homes in the south side of Columbus, Franklin County. In an effort to mitigate Ohio Housing Finance Agency's risk in a weakened housing market, Ohio Housing Finance Agency has developed a pilot program to approve organizations to build/rehab and sell houses as opposed to approving an entire development project. Ohio Housing Finance Agency would approve each house/proposed budget on an individual basis and Housing Development Gap Financing funds cannot be drawn until Ohio Housing Finance Agency qualifies a potential homebuyer.

Community Housing Network, Inc. received a \$750,000 loan for Community Housing Network (CHN) Far North, a scattered-site, rehabilitation housing credit development in Columbus, Franklin County, that provides permanent supportive housing for special needs (mental illness/chemical addiction) residents. This is the fourth of six phases of development in this CHN initiative. CHN Far North will consist of 66 affordable units throughout north and east Columbus. The development will include 14 units affordable to households at or below 35 percent of the area median gross income, and 51 units affordable to households at or below 50 percent of the area median gross income. One unit will house a resident manager. Ohio Housing Finance Agency will monitor six Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units. CHN Far North offers a number of project and unit amenities, including energy efficient and sustainable features.

Community Housing Network, Inc. received a \$750,000 loan for Community Housing Network (CHN) University District, a scattered-site, rehabilitation housing credit development in Columbus, Franklin County, that provides permanent supportive housing for special needs (mental illness/chemical addiction) residents. This is the fifth of six phases of development in this CHN initiative. CHN University District will consist of 68 affordable units throughout the Ohio State University area in Columbus. The development will include 14 units affordable to households at or below 35 percent of the area median gross income, and 54 units affordable to households at or below 50 percent of the area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency will monitor seven Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units. CHN University District offers a number of project and unit amenities, including energy efficient and sustainable features.

Community Housing Network, Inc. received a \$450,000 grant to provide 128 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless disabled single men and women and households with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Franklin County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. Community Housing Network will provide 45 new units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled single men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Franklin County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program projects that 90 percent of households will stay six months or longer. The program will serve a total of 241 households and 331 people.

Economic and Community Development Institute, Inc. received a \$60,000 grant to assist motivated low- and moderate-income people in their efforts to establish or expand

microenterprises through a combination of classes, workshops, and one-on-one counseling. Economic and Community Development Institute, Inc. will couple the training provided with the opportunity to access capital for people who do not qualify for traditional business credit.

Economic and Community Development Institute, Inc. received a \$300,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Franklin County. The program will serve 107 households consisting of 107 people.

Frontier Community Services received a \$750,000 loan for Lamplight Senior Village, a 50-unit new construction, senior, multi-family development project planned for Grove City, Franklin County. The project consists of two two-story apartment buildings, three one-story cottage buildings, and a community building. Ten units will be affordable to seniors at 35 percent of area median gross income; 10 units will be affordable to seniors at 50 percent of area median gross income and 30 units will be affordable to seniors at 60 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency will monitor five Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units at the project. The project includes immediate access to public transportation and shopping.

INCREASE Community Development Corporation received a \$60,000 grant to assist motivated low- and moderate-income people in their efforts to establish or expand microenterprises through a combination of classes, workshops, and one-on-one counseling. INCREASE Community Development Corporation will couple the training provided with the opportunity to access capital for people who do not qualify for traditional business credit.

National Church Residences received a \$450,000 grant to provide 300 units of permanent supportive housing at three developments to homeless, disabled single men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Franklin County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program will serve 350 people. The program projects that 85 percent of households will stay six months or longer.

Southeast, Inc. received a \$272,000 grant to provide 10 units of transitional housing and services for homeless single men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Franklin County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 160 people.

The YMCA of Central Ohio received a \$179,500 grant to provide 243 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless disabled single men and women and couples who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Franklin County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program will serve 444 people. The program projects that 96 percent of households will stay six months or longer.

The Young Women's Christian Association received a \$104,500 grant to provide 69 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled single women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Franklin County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program will serve 85 people. The program projects that 85 percent of households will stay six months or longer.

SFY 2012

Columbus Housing Partnership, Inc. received a \$300,000 loan for the building at 614 Cleveland Road, a two-story single family home built in 1901. It was purchased in 1989 and converted into a duplex with a one-bedroom unit and a two-bedroom unit. The requested upgrades improve the building's exterior and lower utility costs. Both properties are home to

people with a household member having a severe and persistent mental illness. Rehabilitation included removal of existing siding and replacement with new vinyl siding. The roof was removed and a new one installed with new gutters and downspouts. Energy efficient windows were installed, and the rear wood deck and stairs were demolished and replaced.

Community Development for All People received a \$57,000 loan for Eastway Village, a 66-unit, new construction apartment community in Whitehall, Franklin County, with one two-story elevator building and seven one-story multiple unit cottages. The project was designed for households 55 years of age and older. Twenty units were affordable to households at 40 percent of area median gross income or below. The developer secured project-based, Section 8 rental subsidy from the Columbus Metropolitan Housing Authority for these units. Eleven units were affordable to households at 50 percent of area median gross income and 35 were affordable to those at 60 percent. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored four Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units.

Community Housing Network, Inc. received a \$750,000 loan for Southside Homeownership II, a non-housing credit homeownership project which involved the rehabilitation of a home in the south side of Columbus, Franklin County. Community Development for All People has targeted homes on Livingston Avenue which has been a focus of the city's HOME Again program. The home owner has been identified and pre-qualified for the unit.

Community Housing Network, Inc. received a \$750,000 loan for Inglewood Apartments which involves the construction of a 60-unit, permanent supportive housing tax credit development in Columbus, Franklin County, for residents disabled by severe and persistent mental illness, many with histories of homelessness. Twelve units were affordable to households with income at or below 35 percent of the area median gross income; 24 units were affordable to households with income at or below 50 percent of the area median gross income; and 24 units were affordable to households with income at or below 60 percent of the area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored four Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units. The development promotes several of Ohio Housing Finance Agency's policies and goals. The development received project-based Section 8 assistance, has an elevator and zero-step entrances along with 24-hour security cameras.

Community Housing Network, Inc. received a \$500,000 loan for CHN Central, a scattered-site, rehabilitation housing credit development in Columbus, Franklin County, that provides permanent supportive housing for special needs (mental illness/chemical addiction) residents. This is the second of six phases of development in this CHN initiative. CHN Central consists of 67 affordable units on sites scattered throughout central Columbus. The development includes 14 units affordable to households at or below 35 percent of the area median gross income, and 53 units affordable to households at or below 50 percent of the area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored seven Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units. Rehabilitation included replacement of roofs, windows, doors, heating, ventilation and air conditioning, water heaters, flooring, plumbing, kitchen and bathroom cabinets, countertops, tubs and appliances.

Economic and Community Development Institute, Inc. received a \$60,000 grant in conjunction with other public and private funds to capitalize direct loans to low- and moderate-income people starting or expanding an eligible microenterprise. The project also included funding for financial literacy training, business development workshops, and one-on-one technical assistance. ECDI has expanded its service area to include parts of northeast Ohio in addition to the central and southwest regions of the state it currently serves.

INCREASE Community Development Corporation received a \$60,000 grant to continue the operation of its Business Development Program targeting low- and moderate-income

entrepreneurs on the east side of Columbus. INCREASE conducts ongoing training which is matched to the needs of the individual. INCREASE also provided one-on-one technical assistance to program participants, averaging two to three one-hour sessions per participant. INCREASE maintains a micro lending program for eligible low- and moderate-income applicants with no access to traditional credit markets. The loans range from \$1,000 to \$20,000.

Maryhaven, Inc. received a \$231,000 grant to operate a 50-bed emergency shelter for homeless men and women in Franklin County. Supportive services include case management, referrals to health and service providers, and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 2,300 people.

Rebuilding Together Central Ohio received a \$300,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 50 percent of area median income in Franklin County. The program served 140 households consisting of 191 people.

The Homeless Families Foundation received a \$245,000 grant to provide 47 scattered-site units of supportive housing for homeless families who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Franklin County. Supportive services include referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The program served 368 households consisting of 1,288 people.

The Young Women's Christian Association received a \$242,900 grant to operate the 210-bed family shelter serving homeless families with children in Franklin County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The program served 1,400 households consisting of 5,000 people.

Volunteers of America (VOA) of Greater Ohio received a \$484,000 grant to operate a 40-bed emergency shelter serving homeless men in Franklin County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 1,040 people. The VOA of Greater Ohio also operates a 20-bed emergency shelter serving homeless men in Cuyahoga County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 800 people. The VOA of Greater Ohio provided permanent supportive housing to homeless families at or below 35 percent of area median income in Franklin County which include at least one person with a disability. The program served 72 households consisting of 216 people. The VOA of Greater Ohio provided an average of 26 units of scattered-site supportive housing to homeless families who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Franklin County. Supportive services include short-term rental assistance, case coordination, referrals to service providers and transportation to necessary appointments. The program served 192 households consisting of 480 people.

SFY 2011

Amethyst, Inc. received a \$204,000 grant to provide 128 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless disabled women and women with children who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Franklin County. Grant funds were used to support housing operations. The program served 210 households consisting of 300 people.

Columbus Housing Partnership, Inc. received a \$120,000 grant to provide down payment assistance and pre- and post-sale counseling to households at or below 65 percent of area median income in Franklin County. Maximum assistance may not exceed \$3,000 per unit. Down payment assistance is limited to 3 percent of the purchase price plus out-of-pocket expenses. The program served 30 households consisting of 75 people.

Community Housing Network, Inc. (CHN) received a \$350,000 grant to provide 128 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless disabled men, women and families who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Franklin County. Grant funds were used to support housing operations and services. CHN Family Homes served 17 households consisting of 50 people. Briggsdale Apartments served 28 people. Community ACT served 46 people and Southpoint Place Apartments served 50 households consisting of 92 people.

Community Housing Network, Inc. (CHN) received a \$400,000 loan for CHN North, a scattered-site, rehabilitation housing credit development in Columbus, Franklin County, that provides permanent, supportive housing for homeless and special needs (mental illness/chemical addiction) residents. This is the first of six phases of development in this CHN initiative. CHN North consists of 72 affordable units on sites scattered throughout north Columbus. The development includes 16 units affordable to households at or below 35 percent of the area median gross income, and 56 units affordable to households at or below 50 percent of the area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units. The development promoted several of Ohio Housing Finance Agency's policies and goals.

Community Shelter Board received a \$600,000 grant to provide an average of 73 units of supportive housing and services for homeless families who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Franklin County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 24 months. The program served 460 households consisting of 1,518 people.

Economic and Community Development Institute, Inc. received a \$60,000 grant to administer its Microenterprise program. Training and technical assistance was provided to 35 low- and moderate-income participants and 10 loans were made available for business start-ups.

Economic and Community Development Institute, Inc. received a \$300,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Franklin County. The program served 107 people.

INCREASE Community Development Corporation received a \$60,000 grant to administer its program. Eight loans were made available for start-ups and 50 low- and moderate-income households received training and technical assistance.

National Church Residences received a \$150,000 grant to provide 75 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless disabled people who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Franklin County. Grant funds were used to support housing operations. The program served 110 people.

National Church Residences received a \$500,000 loan for Avondale Woods at Dublin for the construction of a 100-unit development for households ages 55 and older in Dublin, Franklin County. Eighty of the units received housing tax credits. The project consisted of two three-story buildings. Ten units were affordable to households with incomes at or below 35 percent of the area median gross income; 40 units were affordable to households with incomes at or below 50 percent of the area median gross income; and 30 units were affordable to households with incomes at or below 60 percent of the area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored five Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units. Project-Based Section 8 Housing Choice vouchers were provided to 58 units; 22 units were unsubsidized, tax credit units; 19 were market-rate units; and there was one non-revenue unit.

NRP Holdings LLC received a \$400,000 loan for Weinland Park Homes, a housing credit lease-purchase development for families that involves the construction of 40 two-story single-family homes located in Columbus, Franklin County. Four units were affordable to households at or below 35 percent of area median gross income; 20 units were affordable to households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income; and 16 units were affordable to households at or below 60 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored two assisted units. Thirty-five of the homes were contained on one contiguous site with the remaining five homes constructed on scattered sites nearby. The project is one component of an \$80 million comprehensive revitalization of the Weinland Park neighborhood. Each home has a full basement and full bath on each floor.

Southeast, Inc. received a \$71,900 grant to operate an emergency shelter serving homeless men and Rebecca's Place, an emergency shelter serving homeless single women. In addition, Southeast, Inc. operates New Horizons, a transitional housing facility serving people who have a severe mental disability and chronic homelessness in Franklin County. Discretionary funds provided the replacement of doors and windows at the transitional housing facility. Funds were used to replace and update the canvas awning, replace the wood that covers the basement window openings with brick, upgrade the security cameras and install new, water fountains on the dormitory floors at the men's emergency shelter. The project serve 1,070 people.

Southeast, Inc. received a \$272,000 grant to operate a 130-bed emergency shelter serving homeless men. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 2,050 people. Southeast, Inc. operates Rebecca's Place, a 47-bed emergency shelter serving homeless women. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 950 people. Southeast, Inc. provided 36 units of permanent supportive housing and services for homeless people with mental illness who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Franklin County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 19 months. The program served 126 people.

The Homeless Families Foundation received a \$97,500 grant to operate a 91-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 135 households consisting of 473 people(SFY 2011).

The Salvation Army Columbus received a \$1,075,900 grant to provide an average of 100 units of supportive housing and services for formerly homeless families who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Delaware, Franklin and Union counties. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 18 months. The program served 490 households consisting of 1,470 people. The Salvation Army Columbus Rapid Re-Housing Program serves homeless families with at least one dependent child in the Ohio Balance of State counties and homeless youth, ages 18-23 in Delaware County. The program served 278 households consisting of 814 people.

The Young Men's Christian Association of Central Ohio received a \$178,300 grant to provide 180 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless disabled men and women who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Franklin County. Grant funds were used to support housing operations. The program served 145 people.

Fulton County

Fulton County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Northwestern Ohio Community Action Commission, Inc. received a \$166,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Paulding, Van Wert and Williams counties. The program will serve 14 households consisting of 37 people. Northwestern Ohio Community Action Commission, Inc. will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Paulding, Van Wert and Williams counties. The program will serve 32 households consisting of 86 people.

The Ability Center of Greater Toledo received a \$200,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Lucas, Ottawa, Williams and Wood counties. The program will serve 55 households/people.

SFY 2012

Area Office on Aging of Northwestern Ohio, Inc. received a \$350,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who were at or below 50 percent of area median income in Defiance, Erie, Fulton, Henry, Lucas, Ottawa, Paulding, Sandusky, Williams and Wood counties. The program served 70 households consisting of 91 people.

Northwestern Ohio Community Action Commission, Inc. received a \$150,100 grant to operate a 13-bed emergency shelter for homeless people and families in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Paulding and Williams counties. Supportive services provided include case management, transportation, referrals to community organizations and permanent housing placement. The agency provided shelter and supportive services to 210 households consisting of 300 people.

Northwestern Ohio Community Action Commission, Inc. received a \$74,400 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 35 households consisting of 77 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 10 households consisting of 24 people. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Paulding and Williams counties.

Northwestern Ohio Community Action Commission, Inc. received a \$200,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Paulding, Van Wert and Williams counties. The program served 50 households consisting of 75 people.

SFY 2011

The Ability Center of Greater Toledo received a \$200,000 grant to provide emergency home/accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Lucas, Ottawa, Williams and Wood counties. The program served 62 people.

Gallia County

Gallia County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Area Agency on Aging District 7, Inc. received a \$315,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Adams, Brown, Gallia, Highland, Jackson, Lawrence, Pike, Ross, Scioto and Vinton counties. The program will serve 65 households consisting of 90 people.

Gallia-Meigs Community Action Agency, Inc. received a \$90,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Gallia and Meigs counties. The program will serve 24 households consisting of 40 people.

Gallia-Meigs Community Action Agency, Inc. received a \$750,000 loan for Heatly Crossing, a housing credit, rental development for families that involves the rehabilitation of 32 flat-style units in one one-story building and four two-story buildings located in Bidwell, Gallia County. Four units will be affordable to households at or below 35 percent of area median gross income; nine units will be affordable to households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income; and 19 units will be affordable to households at or below 60 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency will monitor six assisted units. Exterior building improvements include the replacement of siding, replacing windows and shutters, and replacing roof shingles. All units will benefit from new fixtures and appliances, new carpeting and furnaces.

Gallia-Meigs Community Action Agency, Inc. received a \$321,600 loan for Gallia Meigs, a non-housing credit, homeownership project involving the new construction of six single-family homes on scattered sites in Gallia and Meigs counties. All homes will be sold to qualified buyers at or below 80 percent of the area median gross income. Gallia Meigs will offer three-bedroom, two-bath ranch-style homes with a one-and-half car attached garage. Three different house plans are available for potential buyers and each home consists of a covered porch, range, refrigerator, dishwasher and walk-in closet. Five of the six sites have been acquired. All sites are unique, have access to water and sewer, and each offers its own variety of desirable neighborhood amenities. These include recreation centers and outdoor recreation.

Integrated Services of Appalachian Ohio, Inc. received a \$255,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless people and families below 30 percent of area median income in Athens, Gallia, Hocking, Jackson, Meigs, Perry and Vinton counties. The program will serve 30 households consisting of 72 people. Integrated Services of Appalachian Ohio will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to families and people below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Athens, Gallia, Hocking, Jackson, Meigs, Perry and Vinton counties. The program will serve 20 households consisting of 48 people.

Woodland Centers, Inc. received an \$82,100 grant to provide four units of transitional housing and services for homeless single men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Gallia County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 16 people.

SFY 2012

Jackson-Vinton Community Action, Inc. received a \$60,300 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 12 households consisting of 38 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to one household consisting of three people. A key partner in providing services was the Gallia-Meigs Community Action Agency. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Gallia, Jackson, Meigs and Vinton counties.

Serenity House received a \$77,500 grant to operate a six-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single women and women with children in Gallia, Jackson and Meigs counties. Supportive services provided include assessment, case management, goal planning, budgeting, referrals to community organizations and permanent housing placement. The agency provided shelter and supportive services to 51 households consisting of 187 people.

SFY 2011

Area Agency on Aging District 7, Inc. received a \$315,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Adams, Brown, Gallia, Highland, Jackson, Lawrence, Pike, Ross, Scioto and Vinton counties. The program served 80 households consisting of 120 people.

Gallia-Meigs Community Action Agency, Inc. received a \$90,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Gallia and Meigs counties. The program served 24 households consisting of 40 people.

Woodland Centers, Inc. received a \$157,200 grant to provide eight units of supportive housing and services for homeless people with mental illness that were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Gallia, Jackson and Meigs counties. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 24 months. Program participants received a maximum of six months rental assistance and 18 months supportive services. The program served 20 people.

Coleman Professional Services, Inc. received a \$545,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance to homeless people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income in Ashtabula, Geauga, Lake, Portage and Trumbull counties through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services. The program will serve 71 households consisting of 139 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Catholic Charities of Ashtabula County, Family and Community Services Inc., Humility of Mary Housing Inc., Ecumenical Shelter Network of Lake County and Fair Housing Resource Center Inc. Coleman Professional Services will provide homelessness prevention assistance to people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Ashtabula, Geauga, Lake, Portage and Trumbull counties through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services. The program will serve 157 households consisting of 372 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Catholic Charities of Ashtabula County, Family and Community Services Inc., Humility of Mary Housing Inc., Ecumenical Shelter Network of Lake County and Fair Housing Resource Center Inc.

SFY 2012

Ashtabula County Community Housing Development Organization, Inc. received a \$120,000 grant to provide an average of seven scattered-site units of supportive housing for homeless people and families who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Ashtabula and Geauga counties. Supportive services include individualized service planning, referrals to service providers and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 12 months. The program served 28 households consisting of 66 people.

Ashtabula County Community Housing Development Organization, Inc. received a \$160,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 50 percent of area median income in Ashtabula and Geauga counties. The program served 22 households consisting of 35 people.

Catholic Charities of Ashtabula County received a \$93,300 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 27 households consisting of 60 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to nine households consisting of 15 people. The key partner in providing services was WomenSafe, Inc. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Ashtabula and Geauga counties.

Womensafe, Inc. received a \$58,400 grant to provide an average of three units of scattered-site supportive housing to homeless women and their children who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Geauga County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals and placement in permanent housing. WomenSafe provided start-up home furniture, security deposits and first month's rent to help families re-establish housing. The program served 50 households consisting of 250 people.

SFY 2011

Catholic Charities Housing Corp. received a \$700,000 loan for St. Lucy Senior Apartments, a housing credit development involving the construction of a two-story building with 34 units located in the Township of Middlefield, Geauga County. All units were restricted to households 55 years of age and older. Two units were affordable to households at 35 percent of the area median gross income; 19 units were affordable to households at 50 percent of the area median gross income; and the remaining 13 units were affordable to households at 60 percent of the

area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored six assisted units. The Housing Task Force of the Geauga County Impact Initiative identified an overwhelming lack of supply of housing for seniors in Geauga County. St. Lucy Senior Apartments incorporate green building and Energy Star standards.

Greene County

Greene County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Community Action Commission of Fayette County received a \$196,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Fayette, Greene and Ross counties. The program will serve 25 households consisting of 35 people. The agency will provide down payment assistance and pre-sale and post-sale homebuyer counseling to households at or below 50 percent of area median income in Fayette, Greene and Ross counties. Maximum assistance may not exceed \$3,000 per unit. Down payment assistance is limited to 3 percent of the purchase price plus out-of-pocket purchase expenses. The Down Payment Assistance and Homebuyers Counseling Programs will serve 214 households consisting of 442 people.

Community Action Partnership of the Greater Dayton Area received a \$180,000 grant to provide seven units of transitional housing and services for homeless single men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Greene County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 70 people.

Family Violence Prevention Center of Greene County, Inc. received a \$115,000 grant to provide four units of transitional housing and services for homeless single men and women and families with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Greene County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 60 households consisting of 120 people.

Housing Solutions of Greene County, Inc. received a \$450,000 loan for Columbus Place, a non-housing credit rental project involving the new construction of six one-bedroom units in the city of Xenia, Greene County. The project will serve homeless people with a severe and persistent mental illness. Ohio Housing Finance Agency will monitor three assisted units. Each unit will include a bathroom, full-size kitchen, new appliances, living room and dining room space, including six parking spaces and six onsite garages. The developer has worked closely with the city to provide a structure and landscaping plan that will blend seamlessly with the surrounding neighborhood. The exterior will be vinyl and brick and the interior will have pleasing yet durable finishes.

Housing Solutions of Greene County, Inc. received a \$93,800 grant to provide 49 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled single men and women and households with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Greene County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program will serve 77 households consisting of 79 people. It is projected that 84 percent of households will stay six months or longer.

Interfaith Hospitality Network of Springfield received a \$460,000 grant to operate a 36-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single males in Clark County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 300 households/people. The agency will also operate a 30-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single females and households with children in Clark County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 400 households consisting of 850 people. Interfaith Hospitality Network of Springfield will provide rapid re-housing assistance to homeless people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income in Clark and Greene counties through financial assistance and housing

relocation and stabilization services. The program will serve 50 households consisting of 100 people. The key partner in providing assistance is Community Action Partnership of the Greater Dayton Area. Interfaith Hospitality Network of Springfield will provide homelessness prevention assistance to people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Clark and Greene counties through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services. The program will serve 160 households consisting of 265 people. The key partner in providing assistance is Community Action Partnership of the Greater Dayton Area.

People Working Cooperatively, Inc. received a \$600,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Butler, Clermont, Greene, Hamilton, Montgomery, Preble and Warren counties. Home repairs in Greene, Montgomery and Preble counties will target people age 60 and older. The program will serve 256 households consisting of 553 people.

Recovery Centers, Inc. received a \$100,000 grant to provide 10 units of transitional housing and services for homeless single women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Greene County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 46 people.

SFY 2012

Community Action Partnership of the Greater Dayton Area received a \$57,400 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 185 households consisting of 57 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 12 households consisting of 25 people. A key partner in providing services was Greene County Metropolitan Housing Authority. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Greene County.

Dayton Area Chapter of the American Red Cross received a \$220,400 grant to operate an 84-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families in Montgomery County. Supportive services provided include assessment, case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The agency provided shelter and supportive services to 174 households consisting of 502 people. American Red Cross-Dayton also operated a 22-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families in Greene County. Supportive services provided include assessment, case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The agency provided shelter and supportive services to 130 households consisting of 390 people. American Red Cross-Dayton will operate a 15-unit permanent supportive housing program serving homeless, disabled households with children who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Montgomery County. Grant funds were used to support housing operations. The program served 17 households consisting of 58 people. American Red Cross-Dayton operated a seven-unit, facility-based supportive housing program serving homeless people and families who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Greene County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The program served 32 households consisting of 96 people.

Greene Metropolitan Housing Authority received a \$186,200 grant to operate Project TOTAL, a 29-unit scattered-site supportive housing program serving households with children who were at or below 35 percent of the area median income in Greene County. The project provided direct housing utilizing Section 8 choice vouchers, public housing and market rate units while providing in-home case management services for up to 12 months. The program served 140 households consisting of 360 people.

Housing Solutions of Greene County, Inc. received a \$151,732 loan for three extended housing projects that consists of nine units in three buildings. All units serve households that were both low income and contain at least one family member with a severe and persistent mental illness. Rehabilitation in the East Walnut Apartments included some units having kitchen cabinets and countertops removed and replaced. New stainless steel sinks were installed, flooring was removed and replaced. The units in the Lost Nation property need similar rehabilitation work such as, kitchen cabinets and countertops, new stainless steel sinks, flooring and lighting were installed where necessary.

ICAN, Inc. received a \$182,305 for three Housing Solutions of Greene County projects consisting of 14 total units in three buildings. All units served people or families that were both low income and contain at least one family member with a severe and persistent mental illness. At 47 North Monroe Street, windows were replaced, bathrooms and kitchens remodeled, and new furnaces and air conditioning were installed. At 34 South Wright, patio doors were replaced and upgraded, wood decking was replaced, and new furnaces and air conditioning was installed. At 69 North Monroe, windows were replaced, kitchens and bathrooms were repaired and remodeled, and new furnaces and air conditioning were installed.

SFY 2011

Community Action Partnership of the Greater Dayton Area received a \$266,200 grant to operate a 12-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families and people in Darke County and an 11-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families and people in Preble County. Supportive services provided include assessment, case management, referrals to community organizations and permanent housing placement. The Darke County emergency shelter provided shelter and supportive services to 150 households consisting of 300 people. The Preble County emergency shelter provided shelter and supportive services to 49 households consisting of 150 people. Community Action Partnership of Greater Dayton provided 11 units of supportive housing and services for homeless families and people who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Darke and Greene counties. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 18 months. The Greene County program provided supportive housing and services to 65 people.

Dayton Area Chapter of the American Red Cross received a \$93,400 grant to operate a 23-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families in Greene County. Discretionary grant funds were used to renovate bathrooms and kitchen areas as well as lighting improvements, flooring replacement and repairs associated with mold abatement. Funds were used to renovate the bathrooms by installing new tubs/toilets, all fixtures and repairing walls, tiles and flooring. In addition, flooring was replaced in various areas of the shelter and new windows were installed. The program served 67 households consisting of 197 people.

Family Violence Prevention Center of Greene County, Inc. received a \$32,700 grant to repair the roof, insulation, windows, and plumbing at 29 project-based voucher locations. Discretionary funds were used to resurface the parking lot at a multi-family dwelling facility. The project served 30 households consisting of 75 people. Discretionary funds were also used to install an Environmental Water System (EWS), replace cabinets and counter tops in the kitchen, children's area, and hotline office, repair kitchen ceiling, and upgrade existing security system. The project served 35 households consisting of 72 people.

Family Violence Prevention Center of Greene County, Inc. received a \$115,000 grant to operate the Hagler Supportive Housing Program with four units of supportive housing serving homeless single adults and adults with children who experienced domestic violence and were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Greene County. Supportive services provided include case management, children's activities and child development training, referrals to

service providers and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of assistance is five months. The program served 80 households consisting of 170 people.

Recovery Centers, Inc. received a \$100,000 grant to provide an average of 14 units of supportive housing and services for homeless women with chemical dependency issues who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Greene County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The maximum length of assistance is 24 months. The program served 68 people.

Guernsey County

Guernsey County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Area Agency on Aging, Region 9, Incorporated received a \$160,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Belmont, Carroll, Coshocton, Guernsey, Harrison, Holmes, Jefferson, Muskingum and Tuscarawas counties. The program will serve 42 households consisting of 54 people.

G. M. N. Tri-County Community Action Committee received a \$419,100 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless households who are below 30 percent of area median income in Belmont, Guernsey, Monroe and Noble counties. The program will serve 184 households consisting of 552 people. The key partner in providing assistance is Crossroads Counseling Services. G.M.N. Tri-County Community Action Committee will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to households who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Belmont, Guernsey, Monroe and Noble counties. The program will serve 35 households consisting of 102 people. The key partner in providing assistance is Crossroads Counseling Services.

SFY 2012

City of Cambridge received a \$125,000 grant to rehabilitate six owner-occupied homes, repair an additional 12 owner-occupied units, provide homeownership assistance to two households, and in coordination with Habitat for Humanity, construct two homes to be occupied by households at or below 65 percent of area median income. Cambridge used a portion of their Community Housing Improvement Program (CHIP) funds to target the Goat Hill area of the city.

G. M. N. Tri-County Community Action Committee received a \$92,800 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 49 households consisting of 123 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 16 households consisting of 27 people. The individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Guernsey, Monroe, and Noble counties.

G. M. N. Tri-County Community Action Committee received an \$87,500 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Guernsey, Monroe, and Noble counties. The program served 26 households consisting of 52 people.

Guernsey County Commissioners received a \$125,000 grant to rehabilitate six owner-occupied homes, an additional 12 owner-occupied homes received home repair assistance, and homeownership assistance was provided to two households. Guernsey County used a portion of their Community Housing Improvement Program (CHIP) funds to target the Buffalo area of the county.

SFY 2011

Area Agency on Aging, Region 9, Incorporated received a \$160,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs for homeowners age 60 and older who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Belmont, Carroll, Coshocton, Guernsey, Harrison, Holmes, Jefferson, Muskingum and Tuscarawas counties. The program served 40 households consisting of 50 people.

Hamilton County

Hamilton County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Bethany House Services, Inc. received a \$225,000 grant to operate a 25-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single women and families with children in Hamilton County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 300 households consisting of 800 people.

Cornerstone Corporation for Shared Equity received a \$375,000 loan for Abington Flats, a multi-family bond, housing, credit rental project with gap financing located in Cincinnati, Hamilton County. The project involves the rehabilitation of a four-story building into 20 units of housing with an elevator. Two units will be affordable to and occupied by households at or below 30 percent of area median gross income; 10 units will be affordable to and occupied by households at 50 percent of area median gross income; and eight units will be affordable to and occupied by households at or below 60 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency will monitor three assisted units. Abington Flats is located at the corner of Race and Green Streets in the historic Over-the-Rhine neighborhood. It was once five stories but a fire destroyed the fifth floor in the mid-1980s.

Greater Cincinnati Microenterprise Initiative Incorporated received a \$60,000 grant to continue to operating its Microenterprise Business Development program. The program incorporates multiple funding sources to fund a comprehensive training and loan program. GMCI continues to innovate with their program and is developing an 'Elite' program which will create a funding a training connection between alumni and current students while potentially increasing the sustainability of the program.

Lighthouse Youth Services, Inc. received an \$81,600 grant to provide 28 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled youth between the ages 18 to 24 and their children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Hamilton County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program will serve 34 households consisting of 54 people. The program projects 97 percent of households will stay six months or longer.

Over-the-Rhine Community Housing received a \$75,000 grant to make emergency repairs/accessibility modifications to 38 affordable housing units located in the Over-the-Rhine neighborhood of Cincinnati. The program will serve 38 households consisting of 50 people. All households will be at or below 50 percent of area median income in Hamilton County.

Over-the-Rhine Community Housing received a \$600,000 loan for 1405 Republic Street, a non-housing credit rental project that involves the rehabilitation of a five-story building in the historic Over-the-Rhine neighborhood in Cincinnati, Hamilton County. The project will have three units for households at or below 30 percent of area median gross income and 10 units for households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency will monitor three assisted units. When completed each unit will have new appliances, ceiling fans, air conditioning and a security system. The rehabilitation will include the addition on an elevator, a community room, laundry and an additional resident storage area. The project is near public transit stops, the central downtown business district, a major medical center and other retail and restaurants.

People Working Cooperatively, Inc. received a \$600,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Butler, Clermont, Greene, Hamilton, Montgomery, Preble and Warren

counties. Home repairs in Greene, Montgomery and Preble counties will target people age 60 and older. The program will serve 256 households consisting of 553 people.

Shelter House Volunteer Group received a \$179,900 grant to provide 18 units of transitional housing and services for homeless single men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Hamilton County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 36 people.

Strategies to End Homelessness, Inc. received a \$912,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance to homeless people who are below 30 percent of area median income in Hamilton County through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services. The program will serve 94 households consisting of 94 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Lighthouse Youth Services and Shelterhouse Volunteer Group.

Talbert House received a \$198,000 grant to operate a 55-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single men in Hamilton County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 500 people.

Tender Mercies, Inc. received a \$275,000 grant to provide 119 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled single men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Hamilton County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program will serve 146 people. The program projects that 92 percent of households will stay six months or longer.

SFY 2012

Caracole, Inc. received a \$203,400 grant to provide 104 units of scattered-site permanent supportive housing to single men and women and households with children with one or more people living with HIV/AIDS in the Shelter Plus Care Program who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Hamilton County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program served 120 households consisting of 180 people.

Center for Respite Care, Inc. received a \$57,200 grant to operate a 14-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single men and women with acute medical needs. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 250 people.

Council on Aging of Southwestern Ohio received a \$500,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who were at or below 50 percent of area median income in Butler, Clermont, Clinton, Hamilton and Warren counties. The program will serve 147 households consisting of 176 people.

Greater Cincinnati Microenterprise Initiative Incorporated received a \$60,000 grant, in cooperation with the Cincinnati-Hamilton County CAA and the UW of Greater Cincinnati, to continue its Microenterprise Loan Fund and Business Support Program. This program provided comprehensive training and access to credit to aspiring low- and moderate-income entrepreneurs in the greater Cincinnati area. GMCI focused its marketing and outreach efforts to severely distressed neighborhoods in urban Cincinnati. GMCI has consistently leveraged partnerships and produced successful outcomes in this program.

Lighthouse Youth Services, Inc. received a \$100,000 grant to operate a 28-bed emergency shelter, serving homeless, unaccompanied people ages 18 to 24 who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Hamilton County. Supportive services provided include case

management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing and aftercare. The program served 240 people.

Over-the-Rhine Community Housing received a \$250,000 grant to provide 76 units of facility-based permanent supportive housing to homeless disabled people who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Hamilton County. The projects were Recovery Hotel, serving homeless single men and women with substance abuse issues; Buddy's Place serving homeless single men and women with a disabling condition; East Clifton Homes serving homeless men, women and families with a disabling condition; and Jimmy Heath House serving homeless men and women who are chronically homeless with chronic alcoholism. Grant funds were used to support housing operations. The program served 106 households consisting of 116 people.

Talbert Services, Inc. received a \$923,335 grant to rehabilitate Grand Development Initiative. This 39-unit permanent supportive housing development located in Hamilton County provides affordable housing for people with a history of homelessness or severe and persistent mental illness.

YWCA of Greater Cincinnati received a \$278,600 grant to provide 18 units of facility-based supportive housing and 11 units of scattered-site supportive housing for single women and families with children who are victims of domestic violence and who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Hamilton County. Twelve of the 18 facility-based housing units were operated by Tom Geiger Guest House. Supportive services include case management, referrals and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 24 months. The program served 72 households consisting of 218 people.

SFY 2011

Bethany House Services, Inc. received a \$225,000 grant to operate a 25-bed emergency shelter serving homeless women and women with children. Supportive services provided include case management, budgeting and financial literacy program, parenting classes, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 300 households consisting of 800 people.

Greater Cincinnati Microenterprise Initiative Incorporated received a \$60,000 grant to administer its program. Training and technical assistance was provided to 80 households and eight loans were made available for business start ups.

Lighthouse Youth Services, Inc. received a \$355,300 grant to operate Lighthouse Youth Crisis Center, a 22-bed emergency shelter serving homeless, unaccompanied youth ages 10 to 17 years of age. Supportive services include case management, after-school and summer programming, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 2,100 people. Lighthouse Youth Services, Inc. provided an average of 35 units of permanent supportive housing through the Shelter Plus Care Program to homeless disabled young adult men, women, and families headed by people ages 18 to 25 who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Hamilton County. Grant funds were used to support housing operations. The program served 43 households consisting of 69 people. Lighthouse Youth Services, Inc. operates the Transitional Living Program, providing an average of 41 units of supportive housing and services to homeless men and women ages 18 to 22 and the children of these women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Hamilton County. Supportive services provided include employment, training, and education skills to gain independence and permanent housing. The maximum length of assistance is 24 months. The program served 100 households consisting of 135 people.

Over-the-Rhine Community Housing received an \$81,800 grant to operate Buddy's Place, a permanent supportive housing program with 20 single room occupancy units in Hamilton County. Discretionary funds were used to make repairs on the building's roof, cornice, and select sections of masonry and steel to preserve the structural integrity of the building. The project will serve 24 people.

Over-the-Rhine Community Housing received a \$25,000 grant to provide 25 units of permanent supportive housing at Jimmy Heath House to homeless disabled people with incomes at or below 35 percent of area median income in Hamilton County. Grant funds were used to support housing operations. The program served 31 people.

Over-the-Rhine Community Housing received a \$68,900 grant to make emergency repairs/accessibility modifications to 27 affordable housing units located in the Over-the-Rhine neighborhood of Cincinnati. The program served 27 households consisting of 29 people.

People Working Cooperatively, Inc. received an \$800,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs/disabled accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Butler, Clermont, Hamilton and Warren counties. The program served 475 households consisting of 1,045 people.

Shelter House Volunteer Group received a \$179,900 grant to operate a 42-bed women's shelter serving homeless single women; a 120-bed entry dorm men's shelter serving homeless men; and a 60-bed step-up dorm men's shelter serving homeless men to better achieve self-sufficiency. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community organizations and permanent housing placement. The project served 1,000 people in the women's shelter, 2,880 people in the entry dorm shelter and 480 people in the step-up dorm shelter. Shelterhouse Volunteer Group, Inc. operates The Drop Inn Center Supportive Housing Program providing 18 units of supportive housing and services for homeless men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Hamilton County. Jackson County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Area Agency on Aging District 7, Inc. received a \$315,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Adams, Brown, Gallia, Highland, Jackson, Lawrence, Pike, Ross, Scioto and Vinton counties. The program will serve 65 households consisting of 90 people.

Integrated Services of Appalachian Ohio, Inc. received a \$255,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income in Athens, Gallia, Hocking, Jackson, Meigs, Perry and Vinton counties. The program will serve 30 households consisting of 72 people. Integrated Services of Appalachian Ohio will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Athens, Gallia, Hocking, Jackson, Meigs, Perry and Vinton counties. The program will serve 20 households consisting of 48 people.

Jackson County Commissioners received a \$59,000 grant to rehabilitate three low- and moderate-income, owner-occupied homes, and will provide 12 low- and moderate-income owner-occupied households with home repair assistance (\$59,000 funded with Ohio Housing Trust Funds to assist households at or below 50 percent of area median income). Two low- and moderate-income households will be provided with homeownership assistance, and rental subsidy assistance will be provided to 20 households with incomes at or below 50 percent of area median income. As a means of homelessness prevention, 17 households will be provided with emergency payment assistance.

SFY 2012

City of Jackson received a \$125,000 grant to provide home repair assistance to 12 owner-occupied households, an additional two owner-occupied households received rehabilitation assistance, and seven households were provided homeownership assistance. Key partners in providing services were Gallia-Meigs Community Action Agency. Individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Gallia, Jackson, Meigs and Vinton counties.

Jackson-Vinton Community Action, Inc. received an \$87,500 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 50 percent of area median income in Jackson and Vinton counties. The program served 14 households consisting of 20 people.

Serenity House received a \$77,500 grant to operate a six-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single women and women with children in Gallia, Jackson and Meigs counties. Supportive services provided include assessment, case management, goal planning, budgeting, referrals to community organizations and permanent housing placement. The agency provided shelter and supportive services to 51 households consisting of 187 people.

SFY 2011

Area Agency on Aging District 7, Inc. received a \$315,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Adams, Brown, Gallia, Highland, Jackson, Lawrence, Pike, Ross, Scioto and Vinton counties. The program served 80 households consisting of 120 people.

Woodland Centers, Inc. received a \$157,200 grant to provide eight units of supportive housing and services for homeless people with mental illness that were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Gallia, Jackson and Meigs counties. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 24 months. Program participants may have received a maximum of six months rental assistance and 18 months supportive services. The program served 20 people.

Jefferson County

Jefferson County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Area Agency on Aging, Region 9, Incorporated received a \$160,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Belmont, Carroll, Coshocton, Guernsey, Harrison, Holmes, Jefferson, Muskingum and Tuscarawas counties. The program will serve 42 households consisting of 54 people.

City of Toronto received a \$96,500 grant to provide rehabilitation assistance to eight owner-occupied low- and moderate-income households. Home repair assistance will be provided with Ohio Housing Trust Funds to 10 very low income owner-occupied households, and rental subsidy assistance to three households also with incomes at or below 50 percent of area median income.

Community Action Agency of Columbiana County, Inc. received a \$676,900 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless households who are below 30 percent of area median income in Carroll, Columbiana, Harrison, Jefferson and Tuscarawas counties. The program will serve 154 households consisting of 364 people. The key partners in providing assistance are the Jefferson County Community Action Council and Harcatus Community Action Organization. The Community Action Agency of Columbiana County will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to households who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Carroll, Columbiana, Harrison, Jefferson and Tuscarawas counties. The program will serve 125 households consisting of 300 people. The key partners in providing assistance are the Jefferson County Community Action Council and Harcatus Community Action Organization.

Jefferson Behavioral Health System received a \$270,300 grant to provide 10 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled single men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Jefferson County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations and supportive services. The program will serve 19 households/people. The program projects that 80 percent of households will stay six months or longer.

SFY 2012

Jefferson County Community Action Council received an \$87,300 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 169 households consisting of 507 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 49 households consisting of 147 people. Individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Jefferson County.

The Urban Mission Ministries, Inc. received a \$270,700 grant to operate Hutton House, a 20-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families with children in Jefferson County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 158 households consisting of 315 people.

SFY 2011

Area Agency on Aging, Region 9, Incorporated received a \$160,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs for homeowners age 60 and older who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Belmont, Carroll, Coshocton, Guernsey, Harrison, Holmes, Jefferson,

Muskingum and Tuscarawas counties. The program served 40 households consisting of 50 people.

Jefferson Behavioral Health System received a \$380,500 grant to operate the 10-unit Beacon House permanent supportive housing program for chronically homeless disabled people who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Jefferson County. The program served 15 people. Jefferson Behavioral Health System provided an average of five units of supportive housing for homeless people, including young adults between the ages of 18 to 24, with substance abuse disorders who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Jefferson County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 10 months. Grant funds were not used to pay for drug/alcohol treatment. The program served 22 households consisting of 44 people.

Neighborhood Development Services, Inc. received a \$1,890,000 loan for Washington Square – Steubenville, a multi-family preservation project located in historic downtown Steubenville, Jefferson County. The property consists of one four-story building with 26 units that were affordable to households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income. The Housing Development Assistance Program funds required the project to maintain at least 10 units at or below 50 percent of area median income for 30 years. The project scope included replacement of all major mechanicals and windows as well as 70 percent of the interior walls removed to accommodate more living space. Each unit has new fixtures, flooring, bathrooms and appliances. In addition, the rehabilitation aims improved the energy efficiency of the building in an effort to reduce long-term maintenance and replacement costs.

Knox County

Knox County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

Behavioral Healthcare Partners of Central Ohio, Inc. received a \$24,500 grant to provide 18 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled single men and women and households with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Licking and Knox counties. Grant funds will be used for bridge funding. The program will serve 18 households consisting of 26 people. The program projects that 88 percent of households will stay six months or longer.

Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action Agency received a \$94,400 grant to operate a 16-bed emergency shelter serving homeless households with children in Fairfield County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 65 households consisting of 163 people. Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action Agency will provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income in Coshocton, Fairfield, Holmes, Knox, and Licking counties. The program will serve 106 households consisting of 265 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Licking County Coalition for Housing, Salvation Army-Newark, Behavioral Healthcare Partners of Central Ohio Inc., and Kno-Ho-Co-Ashland Community Action Agency. Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action Agency will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Coshocton, Fairfield, Holmes, Knox, and Licking counties. The program will serve 170 households consisting of 425 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Licking County Coalition for Housing, Salvation Army-Newark, Behavioral Healthcare Partners of Central Ohio Inc., and Kno-Ho-Co-Ashland Community Action Agency.

Kno-Ho-Co-Ashland Community Action Commission received a \$175,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Ashland Coshocton, Holmes and Knox counties. The program will serve 24 households consisting of 100 people.

Kno-Ho-Co-Ashland Community Action Commission received a \$241,900 grant to operate emergency shelters serving homeless households with children in Ashland, Coshocton, Holmes and Knox counties. Combined, the shelters contain 26 beds. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 70 households consisting of 210 people.

Ohio District 5 Area Agency on Aging, Inc. received an \$800,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners ages 18 to 59 with disabilities and homeowners age 60 and older. Households served by the program will be at or below 50 percent of area median income in Ashland, Crawford, Huron, Knox, Marion, Morrow, Richland, Seneca and Wyandot counties. The program will serve 240 households consisting of 360 people.

SFY 2012

Community Action – Wayne/Medina received an \$85,200 grant to operate 12 units of scattered-site transitional housing for homeless single men and women diagnosed with a mental health disorder and substance abuse who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Knox and Licking counties. Supportive services include case coordination, vocational

rehabilitation and placement in permanent housing. Grant funds were not used for drug and alcohol treatment. The program served 23 households consisting of 28 people.

Licking County Coalition for Housing received a \$105,600 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 80 households consisting of 184 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to four households consisting of 12 people. Key partners in providing services will be Kno-Ho-Co- Ashland CAC, the Salvation Army and Behavioral Healthcare Partners of Central Ohio. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Knox and Licking counties.

The Main Place, Inc. received a \$210,500 grant to operate a six-unit permanent supportive housing program serving single men and women with mental illness who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Licking County. Grant funds were not used for mental health treatment. The program served seven people. The Main Place operates a 20-unit scattered-site supportive housing program serving single people with mental illness who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Knox and Licking counties. Supportive services include referrals to local service providers and transportation to necessary appointments. Grant funds were not used for mental health treatment. The program served 24 people.

SFY 2011

Ohio District 5 Area Agency on Aging, Inc. received an \$800,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Ashland, Crawford, Huron, Knox, Marion, Morrow, Richland, Seneca and Wyandot counties. The program served 240 households consisting of 360 people.

The Main Place, Inc. received a \$110,600 grant to operate a six-unit transitional housing program serving homeless people with mental health and/or substance abuse use disorders in Knox and Licking counties. Discretionary funds were used to upgrade the electrical service and provide individual heating and cooling units. This included new 800 amp meters and new 100 amp breaker boxes for each apartment. These repairs were necessary to bring the facility up to code and correct safety issues. The program served six people.

Lake County

Lake County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

Coleman Professional Services, Inc. received a \$545,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income in Ashtabula, Geauga, Lake, Portage and Trumbull counties. The program will serve 71 households consisting of 139 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Catholic Charities of Ashtabula County, Family and Community Services Inc., Humility of Mary Housing Inc., Ecumenical Shelter Network of Lake County and Fair Housing Resource Center Inc. Coleman Professional Services will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Ashtabula, Geauga, Lake, Portage and Trumbull counties. The program will serve 157 households consisting of 372 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Catholic Charities of Ashtabula County, Family and Community Services Inc., Humility of Mary Housing Inc., Ecumenical Shelter Network of Lake County and Fair Housing Resource Center Inc.

Ecumenical Shelter Network of Lake County, Inc. received a \$192,200 grant to operate a 35-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single men and women and households with children in Lake County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 625 households consisting of 700 people.

Extended Housing, Inc. received a \$15,000 grant to provide 12 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Lake County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program will serve 14 people. The program projects that 100 percent of households will stay six months or longer.

SFY 2012

Ecumenical Shelter Network of Lake County, Inc. received an \$88,000 grant to provide 15 units of scattered-site supportive housing to homeless families and people who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Lake County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The program served 15 households consisting of 20 people.

Extended Housing, Inc. received a \$145,000 grant to provide 70 units of permanent supportive housing including 55 Shelter Plus Care units to homeless single men, women and families with a disability who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Lake County. The program served 86 people consisting of 105 people.

Extended Housing, Inc. received a \$57,041 loan for Wilmington Pike Apartments purchased by Eastway Corporation in 1982 with Capital Grant dollars from the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services. This two-story building consists of eight units for people with severe and persistent mental illness. The property, constructed in 1963, has four apartments on each floor with no elevator. Rehabilitation work included replacement of front and rear exterior entrance doors, addition of laundry area on first floor, first floor ADA-compliant bathroom renovation, one insulated window replacement, roof replacement, addition of blown-in fiberglass attic insulation, replacement of fire alarm with new ADA compliant system, which included horn strobes in hallways of both floors.

Extended Housing, Inc. received a \$850,000 loan for McKinley Grove, an Housing Development Assistance Program-funded multi-family rental development for people who have experienced long-term homelessness that involves the new construction of a two-story, 17-unit building located in Painesville, Lake County. Twelve units were affordable to households at or below 35 percent of area median gross income and five units were affordable to households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored six assisted units. Since 1987, Extended Housing has purchased or built 18 properties whose residents utilize some form of rental subsidy. They currently manage 128 vouchers through HUD's Shelter Plus Care, the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services, the Lake County Commissioners, the Ohio Development Services Agency, and the Lake County ADAMHS Board.

Knox Metropolitan Housing Authority received a \$153,900 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 50 households consisting of 125 people. A key partner in providing services was Fair Housing Resource, Inc. In addition, Lake County provided rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 24 households consisting of 60 people. Individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Lake County.

SFY 2011

Ecumenical Shelter Network of Lake County, Inc. received a \$192,200 grant to operate a 32-bed emergency shelter serving homeless men, women and families. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 570 households consisting of 620 people.

Lawrence County

Lawrence County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

Area Agency on Aging District 7, Inc. received a \$315,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Adams, Brown, Gallia, Highland, Jackson, Lawrence, Pike, Ross, Scioto and Vinton counties. The program will serve 65 households consisting of 90 people.

The Community Action Committee of Pike County received a \$210,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income in Adams, Brown, Lawrence, Pike and Scioto counties. The program will serve 152 households consisting of 570 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Adams-Brown Counties Economic Opportunities, Inc.; Ironton Lawrence Community Action Organization; and Scioto Christian Ministry, Inc. **Community Action Committee of Pike County, Inc.** will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Adams, Brown, Lawrence, Pike and Scioto counties. The program will serve 99 households consisting of 371 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Adams-Brown Counties Economic Opportunities, Inc.; Ironton Lawrence Community Action Organization; and Scioto Christian Ministry, Inc.

The Community Action Committee of Pike County received a \$241,500 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 400 households consisting of 1,200 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 150 households consisting of 450 people. Key partners in providing services will be Ironton Lawrence County Community Action Organization and Scioto Christian Ministries. All people served were below 30 percent of area median income in Lawrence, Pike and Scioto counties.

Area Agency on Aging District 7, Inc. received a \$315,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Adams, Brown, Gallia, Highland, Jackson, Lawrence, Pike, Ross, Scioto and Vinton counties. The program served 80 households consisting of 120 people.

City of Pataskala received a \$19,000 grant to provide eight low- and moderate-income owner-occupied households with rehabilitation assistance, and an additional 13 low- and moderate-income owner-occupied households with home repair assistance. A portion of the home repair assistance (\$19,000) was funded with Ohio Housing Trust Funds which are limited to 50 percent of area median income and below.

Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action Agency received a \$94,400 grant to operate a 16-bed emergency shelter serving homeless households with children in Fairfield County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 65 households consisting of 163 people. Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action Agency will provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income in Coshocton, Fairfield, Holmes, Knox and Licking counties. The program will serve 106 households consisting of 265 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Licking County Coalition for Housing, Salvation Army-Newark, Behavioral Healthcare Partners of Central Ohio Inc., and Kno-Ho-Co-Ashland Community Action Agency. Lancaster-Fairfield Community Action Agency will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Coshocton, Fairfield, Holmes, Knox and Licking counties. The program will serve 170 households consisting of 425 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Licking County Coalition for Housing, Salvation Army-Newark, Behavioral Healthcare Partners of Central Ohio Inc., and Kno-Ho-Co-Ashland Community Action Agency.

The Salvation Army received a \$288,000 grant to operate a 53-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single men and women and households with children in Licking County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 892 households consisting of 1,217 people.

SFY 2012

Wallick Asset Management received a \$1,000,000 loan for Newark Village Apartments, a housing credit development that included the acquisition and rehabilitation of a multi-family development in Newark, Licking County. The project's 10 buildings contain 46 one-, two-, three- and four-bedroom units that serve low- and moderate income families. Three units were affordable at or below 35 percent of area median income; 25 units were affordable at or below 50 percent of area median income; and 18 units were affordable at or below 60 percent of area median income. The Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored 10 Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units. Supportive services include case coordination, vocational rehabilitation and placement in permanent housing. Grant funds were not used for drug and alcohol treatment. The program served 23 households consisting of 28 people.

LEADS Community Action Agency received a \$175,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 50 percent of area median income in Licking County. The program served 70 households consisting of 116 people.

Licking County Coalition for Housing received a \$174,500 grant to operate a 45-unit facility-based transitional housing program for homeless families and single adults who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Licking County. Supportive services include case management, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The program served 185 Households consisting of 330 people.

Licking County Coalition for Housing received a \$105,600 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 80 households consisting of 184 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to four households consisting of 12 people. Key partners in providing services will be Kno-Ho-Co- Ashland Community Action Commission, the Salvation Army and Behavioral Healthcare Partners of Central Ohio. Individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Licking and Knox counties.

The Main Place, Inc. received a \$210,500 grant to operate a six-unit permanent supportive housing program serving single men and women with mental illness who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Licking County. Grant funds were not used for mental health treatment. The program served seven households/people. The Main Place operates a 20-unit scattered-site supportive housing program serving single people with mental illness who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Licking and Knox counties. Supportive services include referrals to local service providers and transportation to necessary appointments. Grant funds were not used for mental health treatment. The program served 24 households/people.

The Main Place, Inc. received a \$543,311 loan for The Place Next Door, a new construction non-housing credit development for people with a severe and persistent mental illness in Newark, Licking County. This single-story building has two units affordable to households at or below 35 percent of area median income and eight units affordable to households at or below 50 percent of area median income. The Licking County Metropolitan Housing Authority provided ten Shelter Plus Care vouchers for the development. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored four Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units. The units are fully accessible. The development is adjacent to The Main Place office where services for residents are provided. The Main Place has served the needs of people for more than 25 years.

SFY 2011

Buckeye Community Hope Foundation received a \$700,000 loan for Newark Townhomes that involves the acquisition and substantial rehabilitation of 51 townhome units for families in Newark, Licking County. The project was built in 1979. Three units were affordable to households at or below 35 percent of the area median gross income; 28 units were affordable to households at or below 50 percent of the area median gross income; and 19 units were affordable to households at or below 60 percent of the area median gross income, with one

employee unit. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored seven Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units. The proposal met the Ohio Housing Finance Agency policy by providing for the rehabilitation of a property with an existing project-based Section 8 rental assistance contract. The developer proposed a thorough rehabilitation including new roofs, windows, doors, siding, gutters and downspouts on the exterior.

The Main Place, Inc. received a \$110,600 grant to operate a six-unit transitional housing program serving homeless people with mental health and/or substance abuse disorders in Licking and Knox counties. Discretionary funds were used to upgrade the electrical service and provide individual heating and cooling units. This included new 800 amp meters and new 100 amp breaker boxes for each apartment. These repairs were necessary to bring the facility up to code and correct safety issues. The program served six people.

The Main Place, Inc. received a \$10,500 grant to provide temporary rental subsidies to seven chronically homeless disabled people who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Licking County and were awaiting a permanent housing subsidy for permanent supportive housing. The program served seven people.

The Salvation Army received a \$288,000 grant to operate a 53-bed emergency shelter serving homeless men, women and families. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers, transportation, resume and job searches and placement in permanent housing. The program served 627 households consisting of 914 people.

Logan County

Logan County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Community Housing of Darke, Miami and Shelby Counties, Inc. received a \$210,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income in Champaign, Darke, Logan, Miami, Preble and Shelby counties. The program will serve 89 households consisting of 178 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Family Abuse Shelter of Miami County, Shelby County Metropolitan Housing Authority, Tri-County Community Action CLS, and CAP of Greater Dayton. Community Housing of Darke, Miami and Shelby Counties will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Champaign, Darke, Logan, Miami, Preble and Shelby counties. The program will serve 51 households consisting of 102 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Family Abuse Shelter of Miami County, Shelby County Metropolitan Housing Authority, Tri-County Community Action CLS, and CAP of Greater Dayton.

Residential Administrators, Inc. received a \$17,500 grant provide three units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled single men and women and households with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Logan County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program will serve five households consisting of seven people. The program projects that 100 percent of households will stay six months or longer.

Tri-County Community Action Commission for Champaign, Logan And Shelby Counties received a \$500,000 loan for Point Village Apartments, a 58-unit rehabilitation project currently serving both family and senior households in Russells Point, Logan County. The project consists of four two-story townhome-style buildings providing housing for families on the north portion of the site and four single-story cottage style buildings providing housing for seniors on the south portion of the site. The project includes the construction of two new community buildings, one for families and one for seniors. Twelve units will be affordable to families at 35 percent of area median gross income; nine units will be affordable to families at 50 percent of area median gross income; and 37 units will be affordable to families at 60 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency will monitor six Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units.

SFY 2012

City of Bellefontaine received an \$82,000 grant to rehabilitate seven owner-occupied units, repair an additional nine owner-occupied homes, provide homeownership assistance to two households, and in coordination with Habitat for Humanity provided funds for the construction of two homes to be occupied by households at or below 65 percent of area median income. Bellefontaine used a portion of their Community Housing Improvement Program (CHIP) funds to target the West Side area of the city.

Tri-County Community Action Commission for Champaign, Logan And Shelby Counties received a \$50,700 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 39 households consisting of 156 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to nine households consisting of 27 people. Individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Champaign, Logan, and Shelby counties.

Tri-County Community Action Commission for Champaign, Logan And Shelby Counties received a \$175,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 50 percent of area median income in Champaign, Logan and Shelby counties. The program served 35 households consisting of 105 people.

Lorain County

Lorain County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Family Promise of Lorain County, Inc. received a \$60,000 grant to operate a 14-bed emergency shelter serving homeless households with children in Lorain County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 56 households consisting of 162 people.

New Sunrise Properties, Inc. received a \$188,650 loan for upgrades on two properties. Pennsylvania Avenue property is a single-story duplex built in 1962, habitable, and in need of minor repairs. West Erie Avenue property is a two-story duplex with garden style units built in 1900 with the upper level unit vacant. New Sunrise Properties began updating this unit for work that was started in the kitchen but never finished.

SFY 2012

The Nord Center received a \$167,000 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 55 households consisting of 138 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 28 households consisting of 70 people. Individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Lorain County.

The Young Women's Christian Association of Elyria received a \$159,900 grant to provide 14 units of permanent supportive housing to single homeless women with a disability who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Lorain County. The program served 20 people. The YWCA of Elyria provided 15 facility-based units of supportive housing for homeless women and women with children who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Lorain County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments, and placement in permanent housing. The program served 45 households consisting of 60 people.

H. M. Housing Development Corporation received a \$123,000 grant to operate Faith House II, an eight-unit permanent supportive housing program serving homeless single-parent families with disabilities who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Lorain County. The program served 14 households consisting of 34 people. H. M. Housing Development Corporation operates FAITH House, an eight-unit facility-based supportive housing program serving homeless single-parent families who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Lorain County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The program served 16 households consisting of 48 people.

SFY 2011

City of Oberlin received a \$110,000 grant to provide private owner rehabilitation assistance to six low- and moderate-income households, two of which were completed in the city's Area 5 target area. Home repair assistance was provided to 11 households at or below 50 percent low- and moderate-income, two of which were completed in the target area. Homeownership assistance was provided to two low- and moderate-income homebuyers. In conjunction with the local Habitat for Humanity affiliate, one homebuyer unit was constructed in the target area. Emergency monthly housing payment assistance was provided to 10 low- and moderate-income households for the purpose of preventing homelessness, two of which were completed in the target area. Two home maintenance classes were provided as a public service.

City of Sheffield Lake received a \$125,000 grant to provide private owner rehabilitation assistance to seven low- and moderate-income households, two of which were in the city's target area – Community Housing Improvement Strategy Area 3. Home repair assistance was provided to 13 households with incomes at or below 50 percent of area median income, three of which were completed in the target area. Homeownership assistance was provided to one low- and moderate-income homebuyer to purchase affordable housing. Emergency monthly housing payment assistance was provided to six low- and moderate-income households as a means of preventing homelessness, two of which were provided to target area residents.

Family Promise of Lorain County, Inc. received a \$60,000 grant to operate a 14-bed emergency shelter program serving homeless families in Lorain County. Supportive services include referrals to service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 50 households consisting of 150 people.

Neighborhood House Association received a \$42,800 grant to replace rusted and broken heating, ventilation and air conditioning units for a 68-bed emergency shelter serving homeless men, women and children in Lorain County. The program served 380 households consisting of 560 people.

New Marshall Plaza Association received a \$1,500,000 loan for Marshall Plaza, a 4 percent housing credit, rental development for families that involved the rehabilitation of 89 units in 11 two-story garden-style townhouse buildings located in Lorain County. Four units were affordable to households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income, and 85 units were affordable to households at or below 60 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored 21 assisted units. The property has been owned and operated by Orlean Company since it was built in 1970 and the building is fully occupied, but was in need of rehabilitation to address its functional obsolescence and age-related deterioration. After rehabilitation, the site has both a community center and laundry facilities for use by residents, a new playground, and onsite office.

Humility of Mary Housing Development Corporation received a \$36,000 grant to replace security doors, install security alarms and cameras, replace severely deteriorated floor decks in apartments, replace damaged carpets, and replace damaged tile flooring in laundry rooms in the Faith House I transitional housing program and the Faith House II permanent supportive housing program. The programs served 24 households consisting of 60 people.

Lucas County

Lucas County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Family Outreach Community United Services, Inc. received a \$156,200 grant to provide 33 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled households with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Lucas County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program will serve 44 households consisting of 95 people. The program projects that 95 percent of households will stay six months or longer.

Northwest Ohio Development Agency received an \$80,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners at or below 50 percent of area median income in Lucas County. The program will serve 25 households consisting of 75 people.

Preferred Properties, Inc. received a \$300,000 loan for Bridge Point Senior Village, a non-housing credit rental project involving the new construction of a one-story building with 11 units located in the city of Toledo, Lucas County. All units will be restricted to households 62 years of age and older. Three units will be affordable to households at or below 30 percent of area median gross income, and eight units will be available to households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income. Two assisted units will be monitored by Ohio Housing Finance Agency. Bridge Point Senior Village will offer a community room with a kitchen, fitness room, computer lab with Wi-Fi and a laundry. The site for the project is within one mile of a grocery store with a pharmacy and bank, bus stop, fast food restaurants and a general merchandise store.

The Ability Center of Greater Toledo received a \$200,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners at or below 50 percent of area median income in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Lucas, Ottawa, Williams and Wood counties. The program will serve 55 people.

The Aurora Project, Inc. received a \$246,800 grant to provide 16 units of transitional housing and services for homeless single females and households with children at or below 35 percent of area median income in Lucas County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 140 households consisting of 182 people.

Toledo Lucas County Homelessness Board received a \$587,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless people and families below 30 percent of area median income in Lucas County. The program will serve 200 households and 600 people. The key partners in providing assistance are city of Toledo, F.O.C.U.S., TASC of Northwest Ohio, and United Way of Greater Toledo. Toledo Lucas County Homelessness Board will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Lucas County. The program will serve 260 households 780 people. The key partners in providing assistance are city of Toledo, F.O.C.U.S., TASC of Northwest Ohio, and United Way of Greater Toledo.

Volunteers of America Northwest Ohio, Inc. received a \$160,000 grant to operate an 18-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single men and women in Erie County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 325 people.

Volunteers of America Northwest Ohio, Inc. received a \$94,400 grant to provide 40 units of permanent supportive housing for homeless, disabled single men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Lucas County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program will serve 40 people. The program projects that 87 percent of households will stay six months or longer.

SFY 2012

Harbor House 300 Beds, Incorporated received an \$82,900 grant to provide 14 units of facility-based supportive housing and services for homeless single females with substance abuse issues who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Lucas County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 18 months. Funds were not used for drug and alcohol treatment services. The program served 60 people.

Area Office on Aging of Northwestern Ohio, Inc. received a \$350,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who were at or below 50 percent of area median income in Defiance, Erie, Fulton, Henry, Lucas, Ottawa, Paulding, Sandusky, Williams and Wood counties. The program served 70 households consisting of 91 people.

Beach House received a \$171,100 grant to operate a 30-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single females and households with children. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 200 households consisting of 480 people.

Neighborhood Housing Services of Toledo, Inc. received a \$253,200 grant to provide emergency home repairs/accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 50 percent of area median income in Lucas County. The program served 52 households consisting of 130 people.

Neighborhood Properties, Inc. received an \$18,000 loan to rehabilitate NPI Berkeley. This eight-unit permanent supportive housing development located in Lucas County provides affordable housing for people with a history of homelessness and severe and persistent mental illness.

Neighborhood Properties, Inc. received a \$275,000 grant to provide 217 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless people and families with children with a severe and persistent mental illness who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Lucas County. Grant funds were used for housing operations, rental assistance and supportive services. The program served 240 households consisting of 270 people.

Toledo Community Service Center received a \$352,000 grant to operate a 65-bed emergency shelter serving homeless households with children. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 400 households consisting of 1,200 people.

SFY 2011

Beach House received an \$87,500 grant to operate an emergency shelter for homeless families and single women in Lucas County. Discretionary funds were used to renovate the shelter's three bathrooms. This included replacing the toilets and sinks, repairing water damaged floors and ceilings and converting a full bath into an ADA compliant walk-in shower. Funds also were used to replace 27 windows and repair water damaged ceiling, floors and walls in the shelter's linen closet. The project served 104 households consisting of 260 people.

Catholic Charities-Diocese of Toledo, Inc. received a \$29,200 grant to operate the La Posada emergency shelter in Toledo serving homeless single adults and families. The agency also operates the Miriam House transitional housing program in Huron County for homeless women and children. Discretionary funds were used to install a fire alarm system and update the security system at La Posada. Funds also were used to install a security system and replace the furnace and hot water tank at Miriam House. The agency served 75 households consisting of 160 people at La Posada and eight households consisting of 24 people at Miriam House.

City of Oregon received a \$62,000 grant to provide private owner rehabilitation assistance to five low- and moderate-income households, two of which were completed in the Olivewood/Van Buren target area. Home repair assistance was provided to nine households with incomes at or below 50 percent of area median income, two of which were completed in the target area. Sixteen renter households with incomes at or below 60 percent of area median income received tenant-based rental assistance subsidies. Two new units were constructed in conjunction with the local Habitat for Humanity affiliate to provide homeownership opportunities to two homebuyers with incomes at or below 65 percent of area median income.

Family Outreach Community United Services, Inc. received a \$501,800 grant to provide an average of 27 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless families headed by a person with a disability who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Lucas County. Grant funds were used to support housing operations. The program served 26 households consisting of 78 people. Family Outreach Community United Services, Inc. (FOCUS) provided an average of 49 units of supportive housing to homeless families and people at or below 35 percent of area median income in Lucas County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 100 households consisting of 316 people.

Neighborhood Properties, Inc. received a \$150,000 grant to provide permanent supportive housing to homeless people with a severe and persistent mental illness who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Lucas County. Permanent supportive housing was provided in scattered-site apartment buildings in the Toledo area. Discretionary funds were used to repair eight apartment buildings. This included replacing roofing at five properties, replacing the water heater at three properties and the boiler system at two properties. The program served 83 households consisting of 97 people.

Northwest Ohio Development Agency received an \$80,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Lucas County. The program served 25 households consisting of 75 people.

The Ability Center of Greater Toledo received a \$200,000 grant to provide emergency home/accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Lucas, Ottawa, Williams and Wood counties. The program served 62 people.

The Aurora Project, Inc. received a \$59,500 grant to operate a transitional housing program for homeless women and women with children in Lucas County. Discretionary funds were used to install air conditioning for the agency's congregate transitional housing facility. The project consisted of two phases. Phase one included the installation of eight mini-split indoor units to provide air conditioning for three offices, kitchen and dining areas. Phase two included the installation of nine indoor mini-split units and condensers for the facility's office wing. The project served 44 households consisting of 61 people.

The Aurora Project, Inc. received a \$246,800 grant to provide 18 units of supportive housing to homeless women and their children at or below 35 percent of area median income in Lucas County. The program served a large percentage of households with substance abuse issues, with the majority of referrals for the program coming for the Lucas County Family Drug Court. Supportive services included case management, goal setting, life-skills sessions and permanent housing placement. The maximum length of assistance is 24 months. The program served 80 households consisting of 124 people.

Volunteers of America Northwest Ohio, Inc. received a \$410,400 grant to operate an 18-bed emergency shelter serving homeless men and women. Supportive services provided include assessment, case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The agency provided shelter and supportive services to 385 people. VOA of Northwest Ohio provided 40-units of permanent supportive housing to homeless disabled people who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Lucas County. Grant funds were used to support housing operations. The program served 45 people. VOA of Northwest Ohio provided an average of 36 units of supportive housing for homeless people at or below 35 percent of area median income in Erie County. Supportive services included case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 268 households consisting of 368 people.

Madison County

Madison County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

The Salvation Army received a \$626,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income in Delaware, Madison, Morrow and Union counties. The program will serve 123 households consisting of 373 people. The key partner in providing assistance is the Community Action Organization of Delaware, Madison and Union Counties. Salvation Army through its Rapid Re-housing Ohio Program will provide rapid re-housing assistance to homeless families with at least one minor child who are below 30 percent of area median income in the Ohio Balance of State counties. The program will serve 120 households consisting of 358 people. Salvation Army will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Delaware, Madison, Morrow and Union counties. The program will serve 80 households consisting of 280 people. The key partner in providing assistance is the Community Action Organization of Delaware, Madison and Union Counties.

SFY 2012

The Community Action Organization of Delaware, Madison And Union Counties received a \$195,100 grant to provide seven units of scattered-site supportive housing to homeless families who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Madison County. Supportive services include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and temporary rental assistance. The program served 30 households consisting of 120 people.

The Community Action Organization of Delaware, Madison And Union Counties received a \$37,800 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 10 households consisting of 35 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 10 households consisting of 35 people. A key partner in providing services was the Salvation Army of Central Ohio. The individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Madison and Union counties.

The Community Action Organization of Delaware, Madison And Union Counties received a \$175,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 50 percent of area median income in Delaware, Madison and Union counties. The program served 48 households consisting of 125 people.

SFY 2011

London Metropolitan Housing Authority received a \$580,000 loan for South Oak Place, a new construction development for low-income families in London, Madison County. The property consists of one quadplex building, with four two-bedroom, one and a-half bathroom units. One unit was affordable to households at or below 35 percent of area median gross income, and three units was affordable to households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored four Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units. Each unit offers a large living/dining room with vaulted ceilings, and a kitchen with all appliances including refrigerator, stove oven, and dishwasher. One unit is disabled accessible, and all units include an extra storage space accessible from an outside patio. Washer and dryer hookups are included in each unit.

Mahoning County

Mahoning County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Beatitude House received a \$108,000 grant to provide 12 units of transitional housing and services for homeless single females and households with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Mahoning County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 22 households consisting of 70 people.

Catholic Charities Housing Opportunities received a \$98,000 grant to provide down payment assistance and pre-sale and post-sale homebuyer counseling to households at or below 65 percent of area median income in Ashtabula, Columbiana, Mahoning, Portage, Stark and Trumbull counties. Maximum assistance may not exceed \$3,000 per unit. Down payment assistance is limited to 3 percent of the purchase price plus out-of-pocket purchase expenses. The Down Payment Assistance Program will serve 30 households consisting of 70 people. The counseling program will serve 120 households consisting of 280 people.

Catholic Charities Regional Agency received a \$234,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance to homeless people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income in Mahoning County through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services. The program will serve 133 households consisting of 305 people. Catholic Charities Regional Agency will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Mahoning County. The program will serve 57 households consisting of 131 people.

Community Action Agency of Columbiana County, Inc. received a \$55,000 grant to continue its long running Microenterprise Business Development program. The program includes a three-component training framework that includes an online self-directed component, one-on-one counseling, and business plan development. Successful graduates of the program will be eligible to apply for a micro loan of up to \$15,000 over a five-year term. The Columbiana County Board of Commissioners are contributing \$17,000 grant toward the program which coordinates with the Mahoning and Columbiana County One-Stop Center.

Interfaith Home Maintenance Service, Inc. received a \$500,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Mahoning County. The program will serve 300 households consisting of 600 people.

The Young Women's Christian Association of Youngstown received a \$108,500 grant to provide six units of transitional housing and services for homeless single women and families with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Mahoning County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 10 households consisting of 17 people.

SFY 2012

Beatitude House received a \$403,300 grant to operate a 12-unit facility-based permanent supportive housing program, serving homeless women and children in Mahoning County. The program served 16 households consisting of 40 people. In addition, the agency also operates a four-unit permanent supportive housing program, serving homeless women with children in Trumbull County. The program served five households consisting of eight people. The individuals served were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Mahoning and/or

Trumbull counties. Beatitude House operates a 12-unit facility-based supportive housing program in Youngstown. The program served 35 households consisting of 110 people. Beatitude also operates a 13-unit facility-based supportive housing program in Warren. The program served 46 households consisting of 160 people. Supportive services included case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. All homeless women and children served were at or below 35 percent of area median income in their respective county.

Catholic Charities Regional Agency received a \$65,000 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 344 households consisting of 760 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 80 households consisting of 168 people. The individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Mahoning County.

City of Campbell received a \$50,000 grant to provide seven households with emergency monthly housing payment assistance as a means to prevent homelessness. Homeownership assistance was provided to two families, 13 owner-occupied homes were repaired and an additional six owner-occupied homes were rehabilitated. Campbell used a portion of its Community Housing Improvement Program (CHIP) funds to target the northwest area of the city.

Mahoning County Commissioners received a \$35,000 grant to provide rehabilitation assistance to six owner-occupied households and an additional 12 owner-occupied households were provided home repair assistance. Homeownership assistance was provided to two households, and as a means of homelessness prevention, eight households were provided emergency monthly housing payment assistance. Mahoning County used a portion of its Community Housing Improvement Program (CHIP) funds to target the village of Sebring.

Meridian Community Care received a \$34,000 grant to operate a six-unit facility-based permanent supportive housing program serving homeless, chronically mentally ill people who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Mahoning County. Grant funds were used to support housing operations. Grant funds were not used to pay for mental health services or drug/alcohol treatment. The permanent supportive housing program served 10 people.

SFY 2011

Beatitude House received a \$41,000 grant to operate House of Blessing, a transitional housing program serving homeless women and children in Mahoning County. Discretionary funds were used for installing energy efficient furnaces and central air at 1427 Fifth Avenue and a central air unit at 290 Lora Avenue. The program served eight households consisting of 16 people.

Catholic Charities Housing Opportunities received a \$115,000 grant to provide down payment assistance and homebuyer counseling to households at or below 50 percent of area median income in Ashtabula, Columbiana, Mahoning, Portage, Stark and Trumbull counties. Down payment assistance may not exceed \$3,000 per unit. Down payment assistance is limited to 3 percent of the purchase price plus out-of-pocket purchase expenses. Interfaith Home Maintenance Service, Inc. received a \$420,100 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Mahoning County. The program served 245 households consisting of 535 people.

The Young Women's Christian Association of Youngstown received a \$108,500 grant to provide 12 units of supportive housing and services for homeless, single women and women with children who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Mahoning County. Supportive services included case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 16 months. The program served 18 households consisting of 40 people.

Concerned Citizens Against Violence Against Women, Inc. received a \$46,300 grant to provide six units of transitional housing and services for homeless single females and households with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Marion County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 18 households consisting of 28 people.

Findlay Hope House for the Homeless, Inc. received a \$202,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income in Crawford, Hancock, Hardin, Marion, Putnam and Wyandot counties. The program will serve 30 households consisting of 70 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Marion Area Counseling Center, Inc. and Hancock-Hardin-Wyandot-Putnam Community Action Commission, Inc. Findlay Hope House for the Homeless, Inc. will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Crawford, Hancock, Hardin, Marion, Putnam and Wyandot counties. The program will serve 75 households consisting of 165 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Marion Area Counseling Center, Inc. and Hancock-Hardin-Wyandot-Putnam Community Action Commission, Inc.

Ohio District 5 Area Agency on Aging, Inc. received an \$800,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners ages 18 to 59 with disabilities and homeowners age 60 and older. Households served by the program will be at or below 50 percent of area median income in Ashland, Crawford, Huron, Knox, Marion, Morrow, Richland, Seneca and Wyandot counties. The program will serve 240 households consisting of 360 people.

SFY 2012

Marion Shelter Program, Inc. received a \$239,000 grant to operate a 19-bed emergency shelter serving homeless men and a 29-bed facility-based emergency family shelter serving homeless women and families with or without children in Marion County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The men's program served 320 people and the family shelter served 350 households consisting of 550 people.

The Marion Area Counseling Center, Inc. received an \$82,200 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 55 households consisting of 130 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 21 households consisting of 52 people. Key partners in providing services were Ohio Heartland Community Action Agency and Metropolitan Housing Authority. The individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Marion and Crawford counties.

Concerned Citizens Against Violence Against Women, Inc. received a \$10,300 grant to provide transitional housing and supportive services to single women with and without children who have exited the agency's emergency shelter. Discretionary funds were used to replace the dumpster pad, two entry doors, and carpet with plank flooring in the foyer and front lobby area. The project served six households consisting of eight people.

Concerned Citizens Against Violence Against Women, Inc. received a \$46,400 grant to provide six units of supportive housing to homeless women and women with children who are victims of domestic violence and were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Marion County. Supportive services included case coordination, referrals to service providers, safety planning, crisis intervention and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of assistance is 18 months. The program served 12 households consisting of 24 people.

Ohio District 5 Area Agency on Aging, Inc. received an \$800,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Ashland, Crawford, Huron, Knox, Marion, Morrow, Richland, Seneca and Wyandot counties. The program served 240 households consisting of 360 people.

Medina County

Medina County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2012

Brunswick Housing Development Corporation received a \$54,100 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 17 households consisting of 25 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to three households consisting of four people. The individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Medina County.

Community Action Wayne/Medina received a \$240,400 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Medina and Wayne counties. The program served 80 households consisting of 200 people.

Medina County Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Board received a \$10,700 grant to provide short-term rental assistance to homeless disabled people at or below 35 percent of area median income who were awaiting placement in a permanent supportive housing unit. The program served six people.

SFY 2011

Medina Creative Housing received a \$750,000 loan for Medina Creative Housing III, a non-housing credit, rental project involving the new construction of three four-unit buildings in Medina Township, Medina County. Two of the buildings include one-bedroom units, and one building includes two-bedroom units. Through the HUD 811 program, residents were allowed to choose their own supportive service provider, and Medina Creative Accessibility was one provider the residents may choose. Gallia-Meigs Community Action Agency, Inc. received a \$90,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Gallia and Meigs counties. The program will serve 24 households consisting of 40 people.

Gallia-Meigs Community Action Agency, Inc. received a \$321,600 loan to develop Gallia Meigs, a non-housing credit, homeownership project involving the new construction of six single-family homes on scattered sites in Gallia and Meigs counties. Integrated Services of Appalachian Ohio, Inc. received a \$255,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance to homeless people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income in Athens, Gallia, Hocking, Jackson, Meigs, Perry and Vinton counties through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services. The program will serve 30 households consisting of 72 people. Integrated Services of Appalachian Ohio will provide homelessness prevention assistance to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Athens, Gallia, Hocking, Jackson, Meigs, Perry and Vinton counties through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services. The program will serve 20 households consisting of 48 people.

Meigs County Commissioners received a \$125,000 grant to provide four low- and moderate-income owner-occupied households with rehabilitation assistance, an additional 11 owner-occupied households will be provided home repairs with Ohio Housing Trust Funds which are limited to 50 percent of area median income and below. In addition, four renter households will be provided homeownership assistance to purchase and rehabilitate a home.

SFY 2012

Jackson-Vinton Community Action, Inc. received a \$60,300 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 12 households consisting of 38 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to one household consisting of three people. A key partner in providing services was Gallia-Meigs Community Action Agency. The individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Gallia, Jackson, Meigs and Vinton counties.

Program participants received a maximum of six months rental assistance and 18 months supportive services. The program served 20 people.

Lima/Allen Council on Community Affairs received a \$187,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income in Allen, Auglaize and Mercer counties. The program will serve 30 households consisting of 90 people. The key partner in providing assistance is Sources Community Network Services. Lima Allen Council on Community Affairs will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Allen, Auglaize and Mercer counties. The program will serve 41 households consisting of 123 people. The key partner in providing assistance is Sources Community Network Services.

PSA 3 Agency on Aging, Inc. received a \$40,400 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Allen, Auglaize, Hancock, Hardin, Mercer, Putnam and Van Wert counties. The program will serve 25 households consisting of 40 people.

SFY 2012

Neighborhood Development Services, Inc. received a \$650,000 loan for Mercer Residential Services, Inc. (MRSI) which owns and operates Jessica Byrd Apartments in Van Wert. The renovation of these units involved the replacement of the large heating and cooling units with a more efficient system. The wall openings were patched and repainted. By completing this renovation, the residents have more floor space in their units and the owner realized a 30 percent savings in utility costs.

SOURCES Community Network Services received a \$62,300 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance to 45 households consisting of 126 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance to 15 households consisting of 42 people. The individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Auglaize, Mercer and Van Wert counties.

SFY 2011

PSA 3 Agency on Aging, Inc. received a \$130,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs for homeowners age 60 and older who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Allen, Auglaize, Hardin, Hancock, Mercer, Putnam and Van Wert counties. The program served 60 households consisting of 80 people.

The Young Women's Christian Association (YMCA) of Van Wert received a \$92,700 grant to operate a transitional housing program serving homeless women and women with children in Van Wert, Mercer and Paulding counties. Funds were used to replace the boiler and remove asbestos. The program served 22 households consisting of 40 people. YWCA of Van Wert County operates a transitional housing program serving homeless women and women with children in Van Wert, Mercer and Paulding counties. Funds were used to replace 34 windows; one bathroom update, replacement of sinks, faucets, countertop unit, two toilets, stall walls, ceiling panels and wall panels; stairwell repair, handrails replaced, wall repair and install anti-skid material on steps; 23 ceiling fans replacement and installation; kitchen repairs, replacement of cupboards, two refrigerators and three stoves; refinish wood floors; and sidewalk repair. The program will serve 89 households consisting of 178 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Family Abuse Shelter of Miami County, Shelby County Metropolitan Housing Authority, Tri-County Community Action CLS, and CAP of Greater Dayton. Community Housing of Darke, Miami and Shelby Counties will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Champaign, Darke, Logan, Miami, Preble and Shelby counties. The program will serve 51 households consisting of 102 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Family Abuse Shelter of Miami County, Shelby County Metropolitan Housing Authority, Tri-County Community Action CLS, and CAP of Greater Dayton.

Community Housing of Darke, Miami and Shelby Counties, Inc. received a \$111,000 grant to provide six units of transitional housing and services for homeless single men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Darke, Miami and Shelby counties. Supportive services include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 65 people.

Miami Valley Housing Opportunities, Inc. received a \$250,000 loan for minor renovations to a three-story multi-family building with 24 units built in 1971. Miami Valley Housing Opportunities (MVHO) purchased the property in 1994. All units are occupied by very low-income, chronically homeless people that are disabled or suffer from mental illness or chemical dependency. MVHO has been providing housing options for this population since 1991. They currently own and operate approximately 368 permanent supportive housing units. Although the property has been well maintained, MVHO has only been able to address basic repairs that require immediate attention. Since 2010 the repairs that have been done include roof patching, parking lot repaving, hallway floor replacement on all floors.

SFY 2012

Family Abuse Shelter of Miami County, Inc. received a \$270,600 grant to operate an emergency shelter serving homeless single women and women with children and an emergency shelter serving homeless men. The shelters have a combined capacity of 37 beds. Supportive services provided include assessment, case management, referrals to community organizations and permanent housing placement. The agency provided shelter and supportive services to 600 households consisting of 800 people.

Family Abuse Shelter of Miami County, Inc. received a \$56,900 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 25 households consisting of 58 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 20 households consisting of 40 people. A key partner in providing services will be New Creation Counseling Center, Inc. The individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Miami County.

The agency requested discretionary funding to complete necessary repairs at three homes operated by the agency. Repairs included replacing and/or repairing basement stairs, damaged walls, kitchen cabinets, a back awning, garage doors and gutters. The program served 21 households consisting of 26 people.

Community Housing of Darke, Miami and Shelby Counties, Inc. received a \$111,000 grant to provide an average of 11 units of supportive housing and services for homeless families and people with mental illness who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Darke, Miami and Shelby counties. Supportive services included case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of assistance is 24 months. The program served 30 households consisting of 65 people.

Daybreak, Inc. received an \$834,400 grant to operate a six-bed emergency serving homeless youth for ages 10 to 17 years in Clark, Greene, Miami, Montgomery, and Preble counties. Supportive services included case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 234 people. Daybreak will operate a 10-bed emergency serving homeless youth for ages 18 to 21 years in Clark, Greene, Miami, Montgomery and Preble counties. Supportive services included case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 216 people. Daybreak provided 54 units of supportive housing and services for homeless single young adult ages 17 to 21 years and young adults with children who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Montgomery County. Supportive services included case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 24 months. The program served 70 households consisting of 95 people.

Family Abuse Shelter of Miami County, Inc. received a \$49,700 grant to operate Franklin House, an emergency shelter serving homeless single women and women with children and Buckeye House, an emergency shelter serving homeless men. Discretionary funds were used to install a disabled ramp and for window replacement at the Buckeye House. Funds were also used to replace a door and for roof repairs and chimney removal at Franklin House. The program served 250 households consisting of 325 people.

Monroe County

Tri-County Community Action Committee will provide homelessness prevention through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services assistance to households who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Belmont, Guernsey, Monroe and Noble counties. The program will serve 35 households consisting of 102 people. The key partner in providing assistance is Crossroads Counseling Services.

SFY 2012

Buckeye Community Hope Foundation received a \$560,000 loan for Monroe Manor Apartments and the rehabilitation of an existing senior housing built in 1978 in Woodsfield, Monroe County. The garden-style units are in seven one-story buildings and consist of 39 one-bedroom units and one two-bedroom units. Eight units were affordable to households at or below 35 percent of the area median gross income; nine units were affordable to households at or below 50 percent of the area median gross income; and 23 units were affordable to households at or below 60 percent of the area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored six Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units. Thirty-three of the 40 units have U.S. Department of Agriculture rental assistance. Rehabilitation work included heat pumps/air conditioning, windows, roof and sidewalk replacements.

G.M.N. Tri-County Community Action Committee received a \$92,800 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 49 households consisting of 123 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 16 households consisting of 27 people. The individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Guernsey, Monroe, and Noble counties.

G.M.N. Tri-County Community Action Committee received an \$87,500 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Guernsey, Monroe, and Noble counties. The program served 26 households consisting of 52 people.

SFY 2011

Buckeye Hills-Hocking Valley Regional Development District received a \$500,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Athens, Hocking, Meigs, Monroe, Morgan, Noble, Perry and Washington counties. The program served 150 households consisting of 195 people.

Crossroads Counseling Services, Inc. received a \$95,000 grant to operate an average of 17 units of supportive housing for homeless men, women, and families recovering from chemical dependency who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Belmont, Harrison and Monroe counties. Grant funds were not used for drug/alcohol treatment. The program served 60 households consisting of 80 people.

County Corp. received a \$150,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Montgomery County. The program will serve 45 households consisting of 90 people.

Daybreak, Inc. received a \$264,000 grant to operate a 16-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single men and women and unaccompanied young men and women in Montgomery County. Supportive services include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 230 youth under 18 years old and 200 single people 18 and older for a total of 430 people.

Daybreak, Inc. received a \$570,000 grant to provide 54 units of transitional housing and services for homeless youth and homeless youth with children between ages of 17-24 who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Montgomery County. Supportive services include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 200 households consisting of 266 people.

Homefull received a \$309,000 grant to operate two permanent supportive housing programs for homeless, disabled adults who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Montgomery County. The programs will provide 90 units of permanent supportive housing and serve a total of 123 people. Homefull will also provide 10 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled households with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Montgomery County. Montgomery County Board of County Commissioners will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Montgomery County. The program will serve 282 households consisting of 548 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Daybreak, Homefull, and YWCA Dayton.

People Working Cooperatively, Inc. received a \$600,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Butler, Clermont, Greene, Hamilton, Montgomery, Preble and Warren

counties. Home repairs in Greene, Montgomery and Preble counties will target people age 60 and older. The program will serve 256 households consisting of 553 people.

St. Mary Development Corporation received a \$500,000 loan to build Lyons Place II. This 55-unit multi-family rental housing development located in Montgomery County provides affordable housing to seniors with low and very low incomes.

St. Mary Development Corporation received a \$900,000 loan for Hoover Cottages, a non-housing credit rental project involving the new construction of five single-story cottage-style duplexes with 10 units located in the city of Dayton, Montgomery County. All units will be restricted to households 55 years of age and older. One unit will be affordable to and occupied by households at or below 30 percent of the area median gross income; six units will be affordable to and occupied by households at or below 50 percent of the area median gross income; and the remaining three units will be affordable to and occupied by households at or below 60 percent of the area median gross income. Seven assisted units will be monitored by Ohio Housing Finance Agency. Hoover Cottages will be located on the Hoover Campus. Residents will have access to walking paths, outdoor seating areas and common space.

The Linda Vista, Inc. received a \$27,100 grant provide eight units of transitional housing and services for homeless single women and women with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Montgomery County. Supportive services provide include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 24 households consisting of 45 people.

New Village Park, Ltd. received a \$1,000,000 loan to rehabilitate Village Park Apartments. This 41-unit multi-family rental housing development located in Montgomery County provides affordable housing to seniors with low and very low incomes.

SFY 2012

Dayton Area Chapter of The American Red Cross received a \$220,400 grant to operate an 84-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families in Montgomery County. Supportive services provided include assessment, case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The agency provided shelter and supportive services to 174 households consisting of 502 people. The Dayton Area Chapter of the American Red Cross also operates a 22-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families in Greene County. Supportive services provided include assessment, case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The agency provided shelter and supportive services to 130 households consisting of 390 people. The Dayton Area Chapter of the American Red Cross-Dayton operates a 15-unit permanent supportive housing program serving homeless, disabled households with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Montgomery County. Grant funds were used to support housing operations. The program served 17 households consisting of 58 people. The Dayton Area Chapter of the American Red Cross-Dayton operates a seven-unit, facility-based supportive housing program serving homeless people and families who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Greene County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The program served 32 households consisting of 96 people.

Dayton Metropolitan Housing Authority received a \$350,000 loan to build Windcliff Village Phase II. This 25-unit multi-family rental housing development located in Montgomery County provides affordable housing for people and families with very low income.

Eastway Corporation received a \$45,905 loan for the Bryant Avenue property which consists of three buildings that received exterior upgrades. New roofing, gutters and downspouts were

installed. These renovations helped seal the building, prevent water damage and possible mold. Nelson Court also received upgrades to the exterior; including lighting, new thermal energy efficient windows, rebuilding of the rear porch and stairs. Upgrades were made to kitchens and baths. Replacing windows and installing new plumbing has resulted in reduced energy consumption and water usage. Exterior lighting improved the safety of the property.

Eastway Corporation received a \$45,881 loan to rehabilitate Wilmington Pike Apartments. This eight-unit permanent supportive housing development located in Montgomery County provides affordable housing for people with severe and persistent mental illness.

Emerald Development and Economic Network, Inc. received a \$176,721 loan for Windcliff Village Phase II, a housing credit multi-family rental community that involves the new construction of 25 units with five one- and two-story buildings located in Germantown, Montgomery County. Three of the units were affordable at or below 35 percent of area median gross income, and 22 units were affordable to households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored two assisted units. New site amenities include an attached community building and an outdoor playground. Residents also have access to existing phase-one amenities.

Homefull received a \$48,000 grant to operate Fisher Square which provides five units of scattered-site, permanent supportive housing to homeless families with children who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Montgomery County. Grant funds were used to support housing operations. The program served 11 households consisting of 24 people.

St. Mary Development Corporation received a \$500,000 loan through the Housing Development Assistance Program. The Ohio Housing Finance Agency provided financing for 1,777 rental housing development units and five homeownership development units to create and improve affordable housing. The rental housing projects benefited approximately 4,975 people and the homeownership projects benefited approximately 14 people. In addition, approximately 50 units received repairs to benefit approximately 140 homeowners associated with the Ohio Department of Mental Health Adult Care Facilities program.

St. Vincent De Paul Social Services, Inc. received a \$603,000 grant to operate a 135-bed emergency shelter for single women with children. Supportive services provided include assessment, case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing in Montgomery County. The agency provided shelter and supportive service to 2,500 households consisting of 4,400 people. St. Vincent Hotel, Inc. also operates a 238-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single men in Montgomery County. The program served 3,500 people. St. Vincent Hotel, Inc., operates 14 units of facility-based permanent supportive housing to homeless disabled households with children. The program served 28 households consisting of 79 people. The individuals served were at or below 35 percent of the area median income in Montgomery County. St. Vincent Hotel, Inc., operates seven units of private landlord-owned, scattered-site supportive housing and four units of facility-based supportive housing serving homeless single women and families with children. Supportive services provided include crisis intervention, stabilization, progressive development, self-sufficiency and placement in permanent housing. The program served 90 households consisting of 250 people. St. Vincent Hotel, Inc., also provides 26 units of facility-based transitional housing for homeless single men in Montgomery County. The program served 85 people. The individuals served were at or below 35 percent of the area median income.

Talbert Services, Inc. received a \$923,335 loan for Lyons Place II, a housing credit rental development that involved the new construction of one three-story building located in Dayton, Montgomery County. Six units were affordable at or below 35 percent of area median gross income; 16 units were affordable at or below 50 percent of area median gross income; and 33

units were affordable at or below 60 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored four assisted units. Tenants benefited from the project being located on the Veterans Administration Campus. A list of services existing on the campus includes access to medical facilities, recreational activities, and retail opportunities. Tenants have access to common areas, including a computer.

The Young Women`s Christian Association of Dayton received a \$132,000 grant to operate a seven-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single women and women with children in Montgomery County. Supportive services provided include assessment, case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 636 households consisting of 900 people.

SFY 2011

County Corp. received a \$200,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Montgomery County. The program served 50 households consisting of 100 people.

Daybreak, Inc. received a \$17,700 grant to operate an emergency shelter and transitional housing serving homeless youth in Montgomery County. Discretionary funds were used to purchase/install 12 security cameras, six of which were used in parking lots and six within the facility. In addition, the funds were used to increase staff visibility of clients by creating openings/installing windows in strategic locations in the structure and by adding windows in doors of selected rooms (i.e. counseling, laundry, classrooms, etc.) resulting in improved security. Funds improved safety and security at the emergency shelter and transitional housing facility. The project served 285 households consisting of 300 people.

Daybreak, Inc. received an \$834,400 grant to operate a six-bed emergency serving homeless youth for ages 10 to 17 years old in Clark, Greene, Miami, Montgomery, and Preble counties. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 234 people. Daybreak operates a 10-bed emergency serving homeless youth for ages 18 to 21 years old in Clark, Greene, Miami, Montgomery and Preble counties. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 216 people. Daybreak provides 54 units of supportive housing and services for homeless single young adult ages 17 to 21 years old and young adults with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Montgomery County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 24 months. The program served 70 households consisting of 95 people.

Homefull received a \$213,000 grant to provide 20 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless people with a disability who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Montgomery County. Grant funds were used to support housing operations. The program served 38 people.

New Englewood Square received a \$1,335,000 loan for rehabilitation of Englewood Square, a 41-unit senior housing property in Englewood, Montgomery County. The project was originally constructed in 1979. Two units were affordable to households at or below 35 percent of the area median gross income; 22 units were affordable to households at or below 50 percent of the area median gross income; and 16 units were affordable to households at or below 60 percent of the area median gross income with one employee unit. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored 18 Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units. The proposal met the Ohio Housing Finance Agency policy by providing for the rehabilitation of a property with existing HUD Section 8 rental assistance on the 40 affordable units. The scope of work included upgrades to the

interior of the units, including replacement of kitchen cabinets, countertops, refrigerators and stoves.

St. Vincent De Paul Social Services, Inc. received a \$150,000 grant to operate an emergency shelter serving homeless women and families in Montgomery County. Discretionary grant funds were used to renovate existing dorms and to reconfigure space to provide increased privacy/security for families. Funds were used to replace all fixtures in each bathroom, repair walls, tiles, flooring, ceiling, exhaust fans, tub rooms, showers and laundry facilities. The program served 1,200 households consisting of 2,000 people.

The Linda Vista, Inc. received an \$84,300 grant to provide transitional housing and supportive services to homeless single women and women with children who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Montgomery County. Discretionary funds were used to replace the roof, install exterior and interior security cameras and install exterior safety lighting. Funds were also used to install security fencing, replace exterior locks, install a new sump pump, replace tub/showers with new tub surrounds and replace the boiler and water heater. The project served eight households consisting of 18 people.

The Linda Vista, Inc. received a \$27,100 grant to provide eight units of supportive housing and services for formerly homeless single women and women with children who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Montgomery County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 18 months. The program served 16 households consisting of 36 people.

The program will serve 25 households consisting of 60 people. The key partner in providing assistance is the Salvation Army.

The Community Action Program Corporation of Washington-Morgan Counties received a \$75,900 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 21 households consisting of 53 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 5 households consisting of 11 people. The individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Morgan and Washington counties.

The Community Action Program Corporation of Washington-Morgan Counties received an \$87,500 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Morgan and Washington counties. The program served 26 households consisting of 52 people.

SFY 2011

Buckeye Hills-Hocking Valley Regional Development District received a \$500,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Athens, Hocking, Meigs, Monroe, Morgan, Noble, Perry and Washington counties. The Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA) of Van Wert received a \$92,700 grant to operate a transitional housing program serving homeless women and women with children in Mercer, Paulding and Van Wert counties. Funds were used to replace the boiler and remove asbestos. The program served 22 households consisting of 40 people. YWCA of Van Wert operates a transitional housing program serving homeless women and women with children in Mercer, Paulding and Van Wert counties. Funds were used to replace 34 windows; one bathroom update, replacement of sinks, faucets, countertop unit, two toilets, stall walls, ceiling panels and wall panels; stairwell repair, handrails replaced, wall repair and install anti-skid material on steps; 23 ceiling fans replacement and installation; kitchen repairs, replacement of cupboards, two refrigerators and three stoves; refinish wood floors; and sidewalk repair. The program served 29 households consisting of 42 people.

Perry County

Perry County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SPICE offers training and technical assistance through business development classes, one-on-one counseling, mentoring, incubator space, and referrals. SPICE provides business finance opportunities to non-bankable low- and moderate-income applicants for amounts ranging from \$500-\$20,000.

SFY 2012

Hocking, Athens, Perry Community Action received a \$107,800 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 18 households consisting of 45 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to three households consisting of seven people. A key partner in providing services was Integrated Services of Appalachian Ohio. The individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Athens, Hocking and Perry counties.

Housing Services Alliance, Inc. received a \$610,000 loan for the proposed acquisition/rehabilitation project of a 24-unit development for families in Junction City, Perry County. The development consists of three one- and two-story buildings with six one-bedroom and 18 two-bedroom units. Nineteen of the 24 units received U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Development rental assistance. Twenty-four units were affordable to households with incomes at or below 60 percent of the area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored seven Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units. The units feature a self-cleaning oven, built-in microwave, a programmable thermostat, Energy Star dishwasher, and manufactured hardwood flooring in the kitchen. Junction City incorporated Energy Star standards, and leveraged federal funds by utilizing a 515 Direct Loan from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

SPICE-Southern Perry Incubation Center for Entrepreneurs received a \$60,000 grant to continue its Microenterprise Assistance Program to assist unemployed or underemployed low- and moderate-income people who live in or plan to start their business in Perry County. SPICE focused on the five townships of southern Perry County which are traditionally underserved by existing economic development agencies. SPICE offers training and technical assistance

Hocking, Athens, Perry Community Action received a \$200,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Athens, Hocking and Perry counties. The program served 50 households consisting of 140 people.

SPICE-Southern Perry Incubation Center for Entrepreneurs received a \$60,000 grant to administer its Microenterprise program. Training and technical assistance was provided to 75 low- and moderate-income participants and five loans were made available for business start-ups.

The key partners in providing assistance are Adams-Brown Counties Economic Opportunities, Inc., Ironton Lawrence Community Action Organization, and Scioto Christian Ministry, Inc. CAC of Pike County will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Adams, Brown, Pike, Scioto, and Lawrence counties. The program will serve 99 households consisting of 371 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Adams-Brown Counties Economic Opportunities, Inc., Ironton Lawrence Community Action Organization, and Scioto Christian Ministry, Inc.

The Pike County Outreach Council of Churches, Inc. received a \$91,300 grant to operate a 10-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single men and women and families with children in Pike County. Supportive services include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 150 households consisting of 280 people.

SFY 2012

Extended Housing, Inc. received a \$57,041 grant for Wilmington Pike Apartments purchased by Eastway Corporation in 1982 with Capital Grant dollars from the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services. This two-story building consists of eight units for people with severe and persistent mental illness. The property, constructed in 1963, has four apartments on each floor, with no elevator. Rehabilitation work included replacement of front and rear exterior entrance doors, addition of laundry area on first floor, first floor ADA-compliant bathroom renovation, one insulated window replacement, roof replacement, addition of blown-in fiberglass attic insulation, replacement of fire alarm with new ADA-compliant system, which included horn strobes in hallways of both floors.

Christian Ministries. The individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Lawrence, Pike and Scioto counties.

Housing Services Alliance, Inc. received a \$670,000 loan for Clough Commons, the proposed acquisition/rehabilitation of a 46-unit development for households age 55 and older in Waverly, Pike County. Thirty of the 46-units had rental assistance provided by U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Development. Three units were affordable to households with incomes at or below 35 percent of the area median gross income, and 43 units were affordable to households with incomes at or below 60 percent of the area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored nine Housing Development Assistance Program- assisted units. The development consists of eight one-story buildings encompassing 45 one-bedroom and one two-bedroom units. The units feature a self-cleaning oven, built-in microwave, programmable thermostat, Energy Star dishwasher and manufactured hardwood flooring in the kitchen.

SFY 2011

Area Agency on Aging District 7, Inc. received a \$315,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Adams, Brown, Gallia, Highland, Jackson, Lawrence, Pike, Ross, Scioto and Vinton counties. The program served 80 households consisting of 120 people.

The Community Action Committee (CAC) of Pike County received a \$60,000 grant to administer its Microenterprise Program. Training and technical assistance was provided to 174 participants and five loans made available for business start-ups.

Supportive services provided include assessment, case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. Discretionary funds were used to replace the tub and liner, toilet, sink and exhaust fan in the shelter's upstairs bathroom. Funds were also used to install a new air conditioner, repair and replace doors, repair and paint walls, build an ADA entrance, install new lighting and waterproof the basement. The project served 60 households consisting of 80 people.

The Pike County Outreach Council of Churches, Inc. received a \$91,300 grant to operate a 10-bed emergency shelter serving homeless men, women and families. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 150 households consisting of 200 people.

The project involves the acquisition and rehabilitation of 11 two-story residential buildings with 65 two-, three-, and four-bedroom townhouse style units and one community building. The Community Action Council of Portage County received a \$200,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs/disabled accessibility modifications for homeowners at or below 35 percent of area median income in Portage County. The program served 80 households consisting of 200 people.

Home is the Foundation received an \$87,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Preble County. The program will serve 14 households consisting of 32 people.

People Working Cooperatively, Inc. received a \$600,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Butler, Clermont, Greene, Hamilton, Montgomery, Preble and Warren counties. Supportive services provided include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 24 months. The program served 70 households consisting of 95 people.

Home is the Foundation received a \$58,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Preble County. The program served 10 households consisting of 32 people.

The program will serve 25 households consisting of 40 people.

Ross County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

SFY 2013

Area Agency on Aging District 7, Inc. received a \$315,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners age 60 and older who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Adams, Brown, Gallia, Highland, Jackson, Lawrence, Pike, Ross, Scioto and Vinton counties. The program will serve 65 households consisting of 90 people.

Coalition On Homelessness and Housing in Ohio received a \$200,000 grant to provide training and technical assistance to Ohio Development Services Agency and community-based, nonprofit organizations across the state; update the "State of Homelessness Report" and the Ohio Balance of state Continuum of Care (OBOSCOC) homeless services capacity analysis; conduct the 2013 COHHIO Housing Conference; assist with the coordination, and review and submission of the OBOSCOC application including writing Exhibit 1.

Community Action Commission of Fayette County received a \$196,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Fayette, Greene and Ross counties. The program will serve 25 households consisting of 35 people. The agency will provide down payment assistance and pre-sale and post-sale homebuyer counseling to households at or below 50 percent of area median income in Fayette, Greene and Ross counties. Maximum assistance may not exceed \$3,000 per unit. Down payment assistance is limited to 3 percent of the purchase price plus out-of-pocket purchase expenses. The Down Payment Assistance/Counseling program will serve 214 households consisting of 442 people.

Frontier Community Services received a \$750,000 loan for Cross Creek Homeownership Phase III, a non-housing credit, homeownership project involving the new construction of five single-family homes in Union Township, Ross County. All homes will be sold to qualified buyers at or below 80 percent of the area median gross income. This project is the third phase of a newly developed subdivision which consists of a total of 36 lots of which 23 lots are vacant. In the previous phases, 10 Housing Development Gap Financing homes were built and sold. All homes will have three bedrooms, two baths, a two-car garage, and a concrete drive and sidewalks. Each home will be equipped with a range, refrigerator, dishwasher, waste disposal, washer/dryer hookup, three ceiling fans, and an electric heat pump with central air.

G.M.N. Tri-County Community Action Committee received a \$419,100 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless households who are below 30 percent of area median income in Belmont, Guernsey, Monroe and Noble counties. The program will serve 184 households consisting of 552 people. The key partner in providing assistance is Crossroads Counseling Services. G.M.N. Tri-County Community Action Committee will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to households who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Belmont, Guernsey, Monroe and Noble counties. The program will serve 35 households consisting of 102 people. The key partner in providing assistance is Crossroads Counseling Services.

Gallia-Meigs Community Action Agency, Inc. received a \$750,000 loan for Heatly Crossing, a housing credit, rental development for families that involves the rehabilitation of 32 flat-style units in one one-story building and four two-story buildings located in Bidwell, Gallia County. Four units will be affordable to households at or below 35 percent of area median gross income, nine units will be affordable to households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income,

and 19 units will be affordable to households at or below 60 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency will monitor six assisted units. Exterior building improvements include the replacement of siding, replacing windows and shutters, and replacing roof shingles. All units will benefit from new fixtures and appliances, new carpeting, and furnaces.

Dayton Area Chapter of the American Red Cross also operates a 22-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families in Greene County. Supportive services provided include assessment, case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The agency provided shelter and supportive services to 130 households consisting of 390 people. Dayton Area Chapter of the American Red Cross operates a 15-unit permanent supportive housing program serving homeless, disabled households with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Montgomery County. Grant funds were used to support housing operations. The program served 17 households consisting of 58 people. Dayton Area Chapter of the American Red Cross operates a seven-unit facility-based supportive housing program serving homeless people and families who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Greene County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The program served 32 households consisting of 96 people.

Coalition on Homelessness and Housing in Ohio received a \$287,200 grant to provide training and technical assistance to the Ohio Development Services Agency and community-based, nonprofit organizations across the state; update the "State of Homelessness Report" and the Ohio Balance of State Continuum of Care (OBOSCOC) homeless services capacity analysis; conduct the 2011 COHHIO Housing Conference; assist with the coordination, review and submission of the OBOSCOC application, including the application training, completion of Exhibit 1 and application review; coordinate the OBOSCOC meetings; assist with the OBOSCOC and Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program Homeless Management Information System; respond to inquiries regarding the OBOSCOC and assist with Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program implementation.

Crossroads Counseling Services, Inc. received a \$95,000 grant to operate an average of 17 units of supportive housing for homeless men, women, and families recovering from chemical dependency who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Belmont, Harrison and Monroe counties. Grant funds were not used for drug/alcohol treatment. The program served 60 households consisting of 80 people.

Dayton Area Chapter of the American Red Cross received a \$93,400 grant to operate a 23-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families in Greene County. Discretionary grant funds were used to renovate bathrooms and kitchen areas that need to be brought up to code as well as lighting improvements, flooring replacement and repairs associated with mold abatement. Funds were used to renovate the bathrooms by installing new tubs/toilets, all fixtures and repairing walls, tiles and flooring. In addition, flooring will be replaced in various areas of the shelter and windows were installed to replace existing, deteriorated windows. The program served 67 households consisting of 197 people.

W.S.O.S. Community Action Commission, Inc. received a \$77,000 loan for the W.S.O.S. 2011 Homeownership, a non-housing credit homeownership project which will involve the new construction of one home. In an effort to mitigate Ohio Housing Finance Agency's risk in a weakened housing market, Ohio Housing Finance Agency has developed a pilot program to approve organizations to build/rehab and sell houses as opposed to approving an entire development project. Ohio Housing Finance Agency would approve each house/proposed development budget on an individual basis. Housing Development Gap Financing funds cannot be drawn until Ohio Housing Finance Agency qualifies each potential homebuyer.

W.S.O.S. Community Action Commission, Inc. received a \$251,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income in Ottawa, Sandusky, Seneca and Wood counties. The program will serve 53 households consisting of 129 people. W.S.O.S. will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Ottawa, Sandusky, Seneca and Wood counties. The program will serve 53 households consisting of 128 people.

SFY 2012

Area Office on Aging of Northwestern Ohio, Inc. received a \$350,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who were at or below 50 percent of area median income in Defiance, Erie, Fulton, Henry, Lucas, Ottawa, Paulding, Sandusky, Williams and Wood counties. The program served 70 households consisting of 91 people.

Liberty Center of Sandusky County, Inc. received a \$173,200 grant to operate a 19-bed emergency shelter serving homeless men, women and families. Supportive services provided include case management, goal planning, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 245 households consisting of 435 people.

W.S.O.S. Community Action Commission, Inc. received a \$250,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 50 percent of area median income in Ottawa, Sandusky, Seneca and Wood counties. The program served 34 households consisting of 64 people.

Housing Services Alliance, Inc. received a \$220,000 loan for Crawford Place, the proposed acquisition/rehabilitation of a 30-unit development for families in Upper Sandusky, Wyandot County. Liberty Center of Sandusky County, Inc. received a \$30,400 grant to operate an emergency shelter serving homeless men, women, and families in Sandusky County. Discretionary funds were used to update the security camera system and add additional cameras in areas currently not covered. In addition, the funds were used to replace the overhang on the front of the building, add a security entrance to the back of the building resulting in improved security, and replace laundry room cabinets. Funds improved safety and security at the emergency shelter. The project served 96 households consisting of 215 people.

W.S.O.S. Community Action Commission, Inc. received a \$476,000 grant to provide 20 units of supportive housing and services for homeless people who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Ottawa, Sandusky, Seneca and Wood counties. Supportive services provided include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 18 months. The program served 20 households consisting of 70 people.

CAC of Pike County will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness Adams, Brown, Lawrence, Pike and Scioto counties. The program will serve 99 households consisting of 371 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Adams-Brown Counties Economic Opportunities, Inc., Ironton Lawrence Community Action Organization, and Scioto Christian Ministry, Inc.

Scioto Christian Ministry, Inc. received a \$157,700 grant to operate a 25-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single men, women and families in Scioto County. Supportive services provided include assessment, case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The agency provided shelter and supportive services to 300 households consisting of 370 people.

The Community Action Committee of Pike County received a \$241,500 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 400 households consisting of 1,200 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 150 households consisting of 450 people. The program will serve 51 households consisting of 102 people. Community Housing of Darke, Miami and Shelby Counties, Inc. received a \$111,000 grant to provide six units of transitional housing and services for homeless single men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Darke, Miami and Shelby counties. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 65 households/people.

SFY 2012

Tri-County Community Action Commission for Champaign, Logan and Shelby Counties received a \$50,700 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 39 households consisting of 156 people. Supportive services provided include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent

housing. The maximum length of assistance is 24 months. The program served 30 households consisting of 65 people.

Stark County

Alliance for Children and Families, Inc. received a \$132,400 grant to operate a 30-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single men, women and families with children in Stark County. Alliance for Children and Families, Inc. received a \$380,000 grant to provide 12 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled households with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Stark County. Community Services of Stark County, Inc. received a \$157,400 grant to operate a 21-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single women and women with children in Stark County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 180 households consisting of 420 people.

ICAN, Inc. received a \$177,714 loan to rehabilitate the 14th Street apartment building, a three-story building constructed in 1958. ICAN purchased the property in 1990. All units are designated for low-income people and families that are homeless and have severe mental illness. The capital improvement funds will allow ICAN to address energy efficiency, safety issues, and provide basic upgrades, which will improve the living environment and quality of life for the tenants. In 1988, the Stark County Community Mental Health Board organized ICAN, Inc. as a 501(c)(3) to develop housing for homeless people with mental illness. ICAN has become the primary CHDO in Stark County for permanent supportive housing for mental health system clients. Currently ICAN has 124 rental units.

ICAN, Inc. received a \$246,000 grant to provide 120 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled single men and women and families with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Stark County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program will serve 160 households consisting of 175 people. The program projects that 94 percent of households will stay six months or longer.

Stark County Commissioners received a \$256,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance to homeless people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income in Stark County through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services. The program will serve 20 households consisting of 25 people. The key partners in providing assistance are ICAN, Inc., Community Services of Stark County, Stark Mental Health and Recovery Services Board, and Stark County Regional Planning Commission. The Board of Stark County Commissioners will provide homelessness prevention assistance to people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of

homelessness in Stark County through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services. The program will serve 56 households consisting of 185 people. The key partners in providing assistance are ICAN, Inc., Community Services of Stark County, Stark Mental Health and Recovery Services Board, and Stark County Regional Planning Commission.

SFY 2012

The Association for Better Community Development , Inc. received a \$150,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs/accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 50 percent of area median income in Stark County. The program served 210 households consisting of 840 people.

Area Agency on Aging, 10B, Inc. received a \$264,400 grant to provide emergency home repairs/accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Portage, Stark, Summit and Wayne counties. The program served 80 households consisting of 100 people.

ICAN Housing Solutions received a \$27,242 loan to rehabilitate 802 12th Street in Canton. This eight-unit permanent supportive housing development located in Stark County provides affordable housing and supportive services to households with at least one family member with severe and persistent mental illness.

ICAN Housing Solutions received a \$138,215 loan to rehabilitate 800 5th Street in Canton. This seven-unit permanent supportive housing development located in Stark County provides affordable housing and supportive services to households with at least one family member with severe and persistent mental illness.

ICAN Housing Solutions received a \$16,848 loan to rehabilitate Richard Place. This four-unit permanent supportive housing development located in Stark County provides affordable housing and supportive services to households with at least one family member with severe and persistent mental illness.

J. R. Coleman Senior Outreach Services, Inc. received a \$32,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 50 percent of area median income in Stark County. The program served 45 households consisting of 65 people.

Stark County Commissioners received a \$72,600 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 12 households consisting of 27 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 25 households consisting of 38 people. The individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Stark County.

Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The agency provided shelter and supportive services to 532 households consisting of 793 people. YWCA of Canton Ohio operates a 10-unit facility-based permanent supportive housing program, serving homeless disabled people and families. The individuals served were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Stark County. Supportive services provided include case management and referrals to community service providers. The permanent supportive housing program served 12 households consisting of 16 people. YWCA of Canton Ohio operates New Beginnings,

a 16-unit facility-based supportive housing program serving homeless families with disabilities. The individuals served were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Stark County. Supportive services provided include case management and referrals to community service providers. The supportive housing program served 40 households consisting of 120 people.

SFY 2011

Alliance for Children and Families, Inc. received a \$512,800 grant to operate a 30-bed emergency shelter serving homeless people and families. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 123 households consisting of 250 people. Alliance for Children and Families, Inc. provided 12 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless disabled people and families who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Stark County. Grant funds were used to support housing operations. The program served 12 households consisting of 37 people. Alliance for Children and Families, Inc. provided an average of 15 units of supportive housing and services for formerly homeless people and families who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Stark County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 24 months. The program served 10 households consisting of 35 people.

Catholic Charities Housing Opportunities received a \$115,000 grant to provide down payment assistance and homebuyer counseling to households at or below 50 percent of area median income in Ashtabula, Columbiana, Mahoning, Portage, Stark and Trumbull counties. Down payment assistance may not exceed \$3,000 per unit. Down payment assistance is limited to 3 percent of the purchase price plus out-of-pocket purchase expenses. The Down Payment Assistance Program served 36 households consisting of 90 people. The Homebuyer Counseling Program served 180 households consisting of 450 people.

Community Services of Stark County, Inc. received a \$168,100 grant to operate a 26-bed emergency shelter serving homeless families and single women. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 160 households consisting of 400 people. Community Services of Stark County provided one unit of supportive housing and services for homeless families and single women who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Stark County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 24 months. The program served two households consisting of eight people.

ICAN, Inc. received a \$40,400 grant to operate a permanent supportive housing program serving homeless families with a severe mental illness in Stark County. Discretionary funds were used to replace 66 deteriorated windows, seven interior doors and one exterior door at 319 3rd Street, NE, Massillon. The program served seven households consisting of eight people.

ICAN, Inc. received a \$353,600 grant to provide 124 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless disabled people who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Stark County. Grant funds were used to support housing operations. The program served 180 households consisting of 190 people. ICAN, Inc. provided an average of six units of scattered site supportive housing and services for homeless families who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Stark County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 24 months. The program served 34 households consisting of 40 people.

The American Rescue Workers received a \$77,800 grant to operate an 18-bed shelter for homeless men in the Canton area. Supportive services provided include short-term shelter, case management, permanent housing placement, and referrals to community-based services for homeless men. Discretionary funds were used to install four interior security cameras and repair two exterior cameras, repair electrical problems, such as three new electrical panel boxes in the basement, kitchen and library, replace existing light fixtures, install central air to the first floor and purchase one industrial freezer. The program served 250 people.

The American Rescue Workers received a \$162,600 grant to operate a 17-bed emergency shelter serving homeless men. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 220 people.

Summit County

Summit County received the following financial assistance from the Ohio Housing Trust Fund.

ACCESS, Inc. received a \$251,300 grant to operate a 32-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single women and women with children in Summit County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 520 households consisting of 928 people.

ACCESS, Inc. received a \$58,700 grant to provide eight units of transitional housing and services for homeless single women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Summit County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 34 households/people.

City of Akron received a \$235,000 grant to provide rapid re-housing assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to homeless families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income in Summit County. The program will serve 16 households consisting of 48 people. The key partner in providing assistance is Info Line Inc. The city of Akron will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Summit County. The program will serve 22 households consisting of 66 people. The key partner in providing assistance is Info Line Inc.

Community Support Services, Inc. received a \$1,000,000 loan for The Commons at Madaline Park, a housing credit permanent supportive housing development that involves the new construction of 60 one-bedroom units targeting people with serious and persistent mental illnesses. Twelve units will be affordable to households with income at or below 35 percent of the area median gross income, 24 units will be affordable to households with income at or below 50 percent of the area median gross income, and 24 units will be affordable to households with income at or below 60 percent of the area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency will monitor 10 Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units. The floor plans were designed with direct input from service providers and property managers. The project will have on-site staff and service providers and the project is located in close proximity to public transit and retail.

East Akron Neighborhood Development Corporation received a \$750,000 loan for Robinson Homes East, a scattered-site, lease purchase development for families which involves the new construction of 30 one- and two-story family homes in the Robinson neighborhood of Akron, Summit County. Six units will be affordable to households at or below 35 percent of area median gross income, 17 units will be affordable to households at or below 50 percent of area median gross income, and seven units will be affordable to households at or below 60 percent of area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency will monitor four assisted units. The proposed units include energy efficient appliances, attached one- or two-car garages with garage door openers, paved driveways, patios, washer/dryer hookups, walk-in closets, large front porches, central air and basements.

Life Opportunity Services received a \$200,000 grant to provide 31 units of transitional housing and services for homeless households with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Summit County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 70 households consisting of 205 people.

Legacy III, Inc. received a \$92,300 grant to provide one unit of transitional housing and services for homeless single women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Summit County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, transportation, referrals to service providers and permanent housing placement. The program will serve 52 households/people.

Shelter Care, Inc. received a \$200,000 grant to operate a 24-bed emergency shelter serving homeless unaccompanied young men and women in Summit County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 1,100 people.

The Salvation Army received a \$124,000 grant to operate a 28-bed emergency shelter serving homeless households with children in Summit County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 114 households consisting of 285 people.

Area Agency on Aging, 10B, Inc. received a \$264,400 grant to provide emergency home repairs/accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Portage, Stark, Summit and Wayne counties. Supportive services provided include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 24 months. The program served 40 households/people.

H.M. Life Opportunity Services received a \$200,000 grant to provide 30 units of supportive housing and services for homeless families who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Summit County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 24 months. The program served 53 households consisting of 165 people.

Legacy III, Inc. received a \$92,300 grant to provide six units of supportive housing and services for homeless women recovering from drug/alcohol addiction who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Summit County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The maximum length of stay is 18 months. The program served 52 people.

Neighborhood Conservation Services of Barberton, Inc. received a \$60,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Summit County. The program served 150 households consisting of 450 people.

Shelter Care, Inc. received a \$200,000 grant to operate a 24-bed emergency youth shelter serving homeless youth ages 11 to 18 years of age in Summit County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program served 800 people.

The key partners in providing assistance are Catholic Charities of Ashtabula County, Family and Community Services, Inc., Humility of Mary Housing, Inc., Ecumenical Shelter Network of Lake County and Fair Housing Resource Center, Inc.

Coleman Professional Services, Inc. received a \$146,400 grant to provide 55 units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled single men and women and families with children who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Portage County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program will serve 65 households consisting of 77 people. It is projected that 89 percent of households will stay six months or longer. Coleman Professional Services will provide eight units of permanent supportive housing to homeless, disabled single men and women who are at or below 35 percent of area median income in Trumbull County. Grant funds will be used to support housing operations. The program will serve 12 people.

Greater Warren Youngstown Urban League, Inc. received a \$190,500 grant to operate a 21-bed emergency shelter serving homeless single men, women and families with children in Trumbull County. Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 560 households consisting of 600 people.

SFY 2012

Beatitude House received a \$403,300 grant to operate a 12-unit facility-based permanent supportive housing program, serving homeless women and children in Mahoning County. All homeless women and children served were at or below 35 percent of area median income in their respective county.

The Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA) of Warren received a \$749,500 loan for the demolition/new construction of non-housing credit multi-family rental development in Warren, Trumbull County. The development is 12 units in one two-story elevator equipped building. Three units were affordable to households with incomes at or below 35 percent of area median income and nine units were affordable to households at or below 50 percent of area median income. The development targeted youths aging out of foster care, homeless women with a disability, and women who had been victims of domestic violence. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored five assisted units. The scope of work included the demolition of an existing pool structure and use of the existing foundation to construct the housing units. Rehabilitation included onsite meeting and laundry rooms.

Supportive services provided include case coordination, referrals to service providers and assistance in obtaining benefits. Grant funds were used for rental assistance and operating expenses. The program served 24 people.

Supportive services provided include assessment, case management, referrals to community organizations and permanent housing placement. The agency provided shelter and supportive services to 716 households consisting of 722 people.

Supportive services provided include case management, referrals to community service providers and placement in permanent housing. The program will serve 350 households consisting of 400 people.

300 Beds, Incorporated received a \$115,000 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 30 households consisting of 75 people. Salvation Army will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to families and people who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Delaware, Madison, Morrow and Union counties. The program will serve 80 households consisting of 280 people. The key partner in providing assistance is the Community Action Organization of Delaware, Madison and Union counties.

The program will serve 25 households consisting of 40 people.

Mercer Residential Services, Inc. received a \$26,794 loan to rehabilitate Mercer Residential. This six-unit permanent supportive housing development located in Van Wert County provides affordable housing for people with severe and persistent mental illness.

Neighborhood Development Services, Inc. received a \$650,000 loan for Mercer Residential Services, Inc. (MRSI) which owns and operates Jessica Byrd Apartments in Van Wert. The renovation of these units involved the replacement of the large heating and cooling units with a more efficient system. The old through-the-wall units were replaced. The wall openings were patched and repainted. By completing this renovation, the residents have more floor space in their units and the owner realized a 30 percent savings in utility costs. The older heating and cooling units had a long history of repairs and even replacement. They are original to the building which was constructed in 1988 with funds from the Ohio Department of Mental Health Capital Assistance Grant Program.

Northwestern Ohio Community Action Commission, Inc. received a \$200,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Paulding, Van Wert and Williams counties. The program served 50 households consisting of 75 people.

SOURCES Community Network Services received a \$62,300 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance to 45 households consisting of 126 people. In addition, the agency provided rapid re-housing services through financial assistance to 15 households consisting of 42 people. The individuals served were below 30 percent of area median income in Auglaize, Mercer and Van Wert counties.

The Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA) of Van Wert received a \$179,700 grant to provide 25 units of facility based supportive housing and services for homeless single females and households with children who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Van Wert County. Supportive services provided include case coordination, referrals to service providers, transportation to necessary appointments and placement in permanent housing. The program served 29 households consisting of 42 people.

The program will serve 65 households consisting of 90 people.

Eve, Incorporated received a \$150,000 grant to operate a four-unit facility-based supportive housing and supportive services for single men, women and families due to domestic violence who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Noble and Washington counties. Northwestern Ohio Community Action Commission, Inc. will provide homelessness prevention assistance through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to people and families who are below 30 percent of area median income and imminently at risk of homelessness in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Paulding, Van Wert and Williams counties. The program will serve 32 households consisting of 86 people.

The Ability Center of Greater Toledo received a \$200,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners who are at or below 50 percent of area median income in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Lucas, Ottawa, Williams and Wood counties. The program will serve 55 people.

It is popular for its location on the west side of Toledo and proximity to amenities. The funding amount for Berkeley was used to lower utility costs. The existing roof was removed and the wood beneath was checked for any rotted areas. New roofing materials were applied.

New Home Development Company, Inc. received a \$63,940 loan to rehabilitate Horizon Apartments. This 10-unit permanent supportive housing development located in Williams County provides affordable housing for people with severe and persistent mental illness.

Northwestern Ohio Community Action Commission, Inc. received a \$150,100 grant to operate a 13-bed emergency shelter for homeless people and families in Defiance, Fulton, Henry, Paulding and Williams counties. Supportive services provided include case management, transportation, referrals to community organizations and permanent housing placement. The agency provided shelter and supportive services to 210 households consisting of 300 people.

Northwestern Ohio Community Action Commission, Inc. received a \$74,400 grant to provide homelessness prevention services through financial assistance and housing relocation and stabilization services to 35 households consisting of 77 people. At 34 South Wright, patio doors will be replaced and upgraded, wood decking will be replaced, and new furnaces and air will be installed. At 69 North Monroe, windows will be replaced, kitchens and bathrooms will be repaired and remodeled and new furnaces and air will be installed.

New Home Development Company, Inc. received a \$65,550 loan for Berkeley Apartments, an eight-unit, three-story brick building rented mostly by homeless, single men. The funding amount for Berkeley was used to lower utility costs. The existing roof was removed and the wood beneath was checked for any rotted areas. New roofing materials were applied.

W.S.O.S. Community Action Commission, Inc. received a \$250,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 50 percent of area median income in Ottawa, Sandusky, Seneca and Wood counties. The program served 34 households consisting of 64 people.

The Ability Center of Greater Toledo received a \$200,000 grant to provide emergency home/accessibility modifications for homeowners who were at or below 35 percent of area

The program will serve 75 households consisting of 165 people. The key partners in providing assistance are Marion Area Counseling Center, Inc. and Hancock-Hardin-Wyandot-Putnam Community Action Commission, Inc.

Ohio District 5 Area Agency on Aging, Inc. received an \$800,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications to homeowners ages 18 to 59 with disabilities and homeowners age 60 and older. Households served by the program will be at or below 50 percent of area median income in Ashland, Crawford, Huron, Knox, Marion, Morrow, Richland, Seneca and Wyandot counties. The program will serve 240 households consisting of 360 people.

The development consists of four buildings, with 20 one-bedroom and 10 two-bedroom units. Twenty of the units received rental assistance from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Thirty units were affordable to households with incomes at or below 60 percent of the area median gross income. Ohio Housing Finance Agency monitored three Housing Development Assistance Program-assisted units. The units feature a self-cleaning oven, built-in microwave, a programmable thermostat, Energy Star dishwasher, and manufactured hardwood flooring in the kitchen. Crawford Place incorporated Energy Star standards, and leveraged federal funds by utilizing a 515 Direct Loan from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

SFY 2011

Ohio District 5 Area Agency on Aging, Inc. received an \$800,000 grant to provide emergency home repairs and accessibility modifications for homeowners age 60 and older who were at or below 35 percent of area median income in Ashland, Crawford, Huron, Knox, Marion, Morrow, Richland, Seneca and Wyandot counties.
